Last night I attended the School Board budget meeting to present my views regarding our school system. Almost all the School Board members were present and maybe 100 people showed up to voice their opinions. I spoke personally (as did my five-month-old from my arms) with Jack Dale (School Superintendent) and Mr. Moon (Board Chair). Isn't it a little surprising that a person can simply walk in and speak to a governor, congressman, or folks who are in charge of a school system serving a million residents? So, if you have any issues or thoughts regarding our schools, transportation, politics, etc., all you need do is get out there and attend meetings and you will be heard. Did you know that each homeowner is responsible for clearing his/her own sidewalks of snow and debris? If someone falls on your snow-covered sidewalk, you could be liable. Aside from that, it would be nice if each homeowner cleared their sidewalk immediately after a snow so that all the children and walkers could walk safely.

Well, our December cover with seasonal greetings in Korean, Spanish, and Vietnamese was a hit but not completely the way I had hoped. I received a number of phone calls from folks who were upset. I realized I should have put a note of explanation in English of our reasoning and goals. Being Christmas, I thought it appropriate to attempt to recognize and bring into our family the other cultures within our neighborhood. I did this by reaching out to them in their native languages. This effort is the culmination of a year of work by four people on the cultural committee. Their hours of work often go unnoticed as they attempt to bridge the gap between the diverse cultures in our neighborhood. Believe me, this is not an easy task and I get many phone calls regarding similar issues which could be more easily resolved if our different cultures understood each other better. I could think of no better time to reach out to our neighbors who we want to participate in our community more and invite them in using their native language. My goal is to bring all cultures into our association and for these adults and children to be involved in our activities.

As you will notice, our cover will continue in English but occasionally we will print the cover or some articles in other languages. I will put a brief explanation in English to explain each article when we do this. Interestingly, due to our work establishing cultural committees and translating abilities within this community, I have been asked by the Braddock District Council to form a task force to teach the other 200 associations how to accomplish this. To the few folks who called upset about not being able to read the cover (and the others who were upset but didn't call), I appreciate your viewpoint and concerns. You are the history of this community and important to us. Try to think of this printing as an accomplishment, a first for our community as it evolves. And regardless, I appreciate your calling and voicing your views. We need to hear what everyone thinks and wants, and we need more volunteers for future projects.

We are looking for members to form two committees: a Concerns Committee to address issues regarding covenants, zoning, parking, noise, architectural, etc., and a Mediation Committee to address serious/long-term issues between neighbors. Let me know if you are interested.

Meanwhile, watch for the changes at our entryway as Spring approaches.

## NUTRITION

This is simple. Spend more; charge more. Offer healthier choices and eliminate junk food. Reinforce good nutrition habits.

## **REDUCE CLASS SIZE - 17 STUDENTS PER TEACHER**

Hire the teachers and build more classrooms if necessary. Raise funds by issuing bonds for the buildings. Increase teacher's pay in order to encourage more applicants.

### ENCOURAGE WALKING TO SCHOOL

# COMMUNITY CLEAN-UP DAY: SATURDAY, MARCH 18, 2006

**The seventeenth (17th) annual Clean-Up Day** this year will again provide an added incentive for "Farmers" to tackle back-yard clutter, messy basements, carports or storage sheds.



The Civic Association has again arranged for Fairfax County trash disposal trucks to be parked at the **Ravensworth Elementary School parking lot** on **Saturday, March 18** from **8:00 AM to 11:45 AM**, for the purpose of collecting items which are not accepted by private trash collectors at curbside. One truck will take metal items and another will take other trash. Now is the time to get rid of old appliances, furniture, mattresses, boards, doors (no glass), swing sets, lawn mowers (thoroughly drained of fluids), piping, etc.

**Items that CANNOT be accepted include** hazardous waste (BATTERIES, including the small "button" and rechargeables, PAINT, USED OIL, pesticides, and lawn care products), TIRES, sheet rock, STONE OR CRUSHED ROCKS, and products that can be recycled - such as newspapers, cans and glass. Also, BRUSH WILL NOT BE COLLECTED. Residents may take their brush to one of the County's two brush recycling centers, located at:

+ <u>I-95 Landfill</u>, 9850 Furnace Road, Lorton. Phone 703-690-1703. Hours 7:00 AM - 6:00 PM M-F, 7:00 AM - 4:00 PM Saturday. Tires (maximum of five without rims) will be accepted at the <u>Lorton Landfill only</u>! Call first!



 <u>I-66 Transfer Station</u>, 4618 West Ox Road, Fairfax. Phone 703-631-1179. Hours 6:00 AM -7:00 PM daily. Hazardous waste, Thursday 1:00 PM - 5:00 PM, Friday 8:00 AM - 12 NOON, Saturday 9:00 AM - 4:00 PM.

Brush delivered to these recycling centers will be shredded into mulch. Therefore, the brush must be free from other debris. Brush containing stumps, rock, metal, etc. will not be accepted because these items damage shredding equipment. Residents may obtain free shredded wood mulch at both these recycling centers.

**THIS IS IMPORTANT!!** You may not dump your trash at the school prior to the arrival of the County trucks or <u>after the trucks depart</u>! Disposing of private trash on school property, or in school dumpsters, is <u>punishable by a</u> \$100 fine.

We need a volunteer with a pick-up truck for assisting those people who need help getting large, bulky items to the school. Make every effort to get your materials to the school on your own as this pick-up is intended mainly for disabled or elderly residents. We do not have sufficient volunteers to clean out basements. To offer assistance or schedule a pick-up, call Dick Sargent at 703-321-9143. For instructions on where to dispose of hazardous waste, call 703-324-5068, and for where to dispose of stumps, rocks and tile, call 703-690-1703.

# GARDENING TIPS FOR MARCH

- Fertilize all trees and shrubs
- Apply crabgrass preventative
- Apply weed control for lawns and gardens
- Cut back liriope and ornamental grasses and prune roses and other summer flowering shrubs before spring growth appears
