### FROM THE PRESIDENT

Neighbors,

I recently returned from China where I had the good fortune to meet with the Director General, Secretary General Beijing Parks and Forestry Department of International Cooperation, Beijing Forestry Society. Having a title that long probably uses a couple extra trees during printing. Beijing has about 35.47% tree canopy. The ideal minimum amount in an urban environment is 40%. We are lucky to still retain about 42% in northern Virginia. With Chairman Connolly's encouragement and complimented by our Urban Forester Mike Knapp, we plan to increase that tree canopy over the next ten years. In addition, thanks to Scott Plein and a devoted group of tree canopy advocates, we have a bill which passed our state legislature: HB 1437 "Trees; conservation during land development process for air quality improvement." This bill passed both the House and the Senate and awaiting signature from Governor Kaine. If anyone in the neighborhood is interested in supporting our efforts to retain our existing tree canopy and plant new trees, please contact me right away. Spring is just around the corner and we are preparing to accept hundreds of seedlings for planting in the Farm.

The Braddock District Council with support from Supervisor Sharon Bulova's office has instituted an excellent plan to engage the civic associations along Braddock Road to finance a beautification project from the beltway to Route 123 down the median of Braddock Road. This project has been approved by VDOT and an effort is underway to get our neighborhood to support this community-wide effort.

Please attend the May 22nd RFCA meeting to discuss these and other proposed projects to improve the land-scaping and image of our community.


### POE MIDDLE SCHOOL MUSICAL



### GARDENING TIPS FOR APRIL

- Spray azaleas and shrubs for lace bug during the last two weeks of April
- Spray junipers and dwarf evergreens for mites.
- Mulch again now, if desired, or in May or early June.



### TRASH COLLECTION AND RECYCLING

Are you sick of being woken up by the sounds of trash being collected on your street? Sick of hearing numerous trash trucks going up and down your street at 6:00 in the morning three times a week? Then let's try and fix this problem. Ravensworth Farm currently has three different companies providing trash collection. That's three different trucks driving through the neighborhood generating unwanted noise and traffic as well as adding to air pollution. Below is a break down of the current cost of each company and days they provided service to our neighborhood.

\*All commercial trash collectors bring their trash to the Fairfax County collection terminals, from where it is transported to the County's incineration and landfill sites.

Want another option? How about having Fairfax County collect the trash and recycling for the entire neighborhood? Sounds great, right! The cost is \$345 per year. That is only \$28.75 a month. You would be billed semi-annually on your property tax bill. They provide once a week pick-up of both trash and recycling on the same day. Also, you can have up to five (5) special pick-ups a year at no charge. So if you need to dispose of a mattress or stove, it won't cost you extra money to have these items hauled away, at least five times a year. Also, if you have any problems with you trash or recycling service, you can complain directly to your provider, Fairfax County themselves, and they will try and rectify the problem.

In order to have Fairfax County collect Ravensworth Farm trash, we would need to complete a petition to have our neighborhood become part of a Sanitary District. Creation of a small or local Sanitary District is possible only when a petition is made and supported by greater than 50 percent of the residents within the neighborhood. The petition would then need to be approved by the Division of Solid Waste Collection and Recycling and the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors.

### <u>DISPOSAL OF FLUORESCENT BULBS AND OTHER</u> HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE

Fluorescent bulbs are very energy efficient and also last five to ten times longer than regular light bulbs. Using fluorescent bulbs will help lower your electric bill. However, did you know that fluorescent bulbs contain mercury? When these bulbs are thrown in the trash, mercury enters our environment and affects both wildlife and humans. A single broken fluorescent bulb can contaminate as much as 7,000 gallons of water.

If you see "Hg" on the label of a light bulb, it means that the bulb contains mercury and should be recycled or managed as hazardous waste. Below are dates and places you can go to dispose of your fluorescent bulbs and other household hazardous waste in an environmentally safe manner.

June 14 (9 a.m. - 2 p.m.) - Community Clean-up Event (Household Hazardous Waste Collection and Recycling Roadshow: Computers and Electronics, Document Shredding). Household Hazardous Waste will be collected at Springfield Governmental Center, 6140 Rolling Road, Springfield, VA 22152. Recycling Event will occur at West Springfield High School, 6100 Rolling Road, Springfield, VA 22152.

September 6 (9 a.m. - 2 p.m.) - Community Clean-up Event (Household Hazardous Waste, Document Shredding), Mason District Governmental Center, 6507 Columbia Pike, Annandale, VA 22003

#### **Rechargeable Batteries**

Recycling your rechargeable batteries from cameras, portable phone, cell phones, laptop computers, and camcorders is easy and a great way to help the environment. You can drop off your batteries at Sharon Bulova's office, 9002 Burke Lake Road, or any Fairfax County Supervisor's office.

#### **Computers**

Wondering what you can and should do with your old computer? Well, recycle it for free! Through the Keep it Green program, and because computers contain materials that could be dangerous if left in a landfill, the ServiceSource Network has partnered with Fairfax County to keep these hazards out of our environment. You can drop off your old computer and equipment at ServiceSource's Edsall Road location between 8:30 a.m. and 4 p.m. weekdays. Donated computers are disassembled so their component parts can be reused.



Most computers are recycled for free, but there is a \$10 charge per monitor to defray the cost of handling the materials and properly recycling the lead found in cathode ray tubes. There is also a fee of \$0.20 per pound for large-scale items such as copiers and floor model printers. Those donating computers will receive documentation for tax purposes.

- 1. Remember a memory is in your heart, not in any item. (Erin Coelho)

- 4. Keep files for all bills.

### **Tree Canopy:**

Trees around the house provide shade, which can save you around \$100 - \$300 on your electricity bill every year by reducing the air conditioning load. Trees are good for the environment, and reduce your ecological footprint by recycling some of the carbon which your home and your car put in the atmosphere.

We can help you plant nice indigenous trees.

Starting April 4 we have FREE seedlings for you to pick up at 5505 Inverchapel Road. The seedlings are between 10" and 24" and will consist of the following:

- **♦** American Plum Hazelnut
- Crab Apple
- Hackberry
- Redbud
- Red Maple
- Northern Red Oak
- Flowering Dogwood
- Virginia Pine

- Sugar Maple
- Chestnut Oak
- Silky Dogwood
- River Birch
- Bald Cypress
- Black Cherry
- Buttonbush

The seedlings are "bare-root" and must be kept moist until planting. They come with tree protectors and stakes and advice on planting. They must be in the ground as soon as possible but ultimately end of April.

## "A HOMEOWNERS GUIDE TO HELP WITH THE GLOBAL WARMING CRISIS."

Written by Victoria Campbell, a sophomore at Annandale High School. This was submitted as part of her MYP (Middle Years Program) project.

The Human drive to invent and build has led us to extraordinary advances and great technological promise; it also has resulted in grave and unintended consequences.

Everyday and everywhere we hear about the concerns of Global Warming and the impact it has on human communities and natural ecosystems.

CAN WE BUILD IT.... YES WE CAN! CAN WE SOLVE IT.... YES WE CAN! CAN WE HALT GLOBAL WARMING....YES WE CAN... AND WE MUST ACT URGENTLY!!!

#### HOW OLD IS YOUR HOME?

Did you know that only about 1/5 of Homes built prior to 1980 are well-insulated?

Insulation could really improve your comfort, save you dollars in utility costs and greatly improve the climate crisis. Without residential insulation, U.S. carbon dioxide emissions would increase about 15%. It would take 300 million acres of forest to reverse those effects.

The savings for insulation and avoided heating and cooling costs amounts to \$84 billion dollars per year!

The Industry has said if all U.S. homes met the insulation standards in the Model Energy Code from 1992, the total residential carbon emissions in the U.S. would fall 30%. For example: Homes with attics should use R-49, walls should be R18, and basement interiors should be R-11 to R-19, exteriors R10. You can contact the Department of Energy for your copy of the Fact Sheet and calculator method.

### **HOW OLD ARE THE APPLIANCES IN YOUR HOME?**

Did you know if your appliances are older than 10 years old, you could be using twice as much energy and costing you twice as much in power bills! For example, did you know that design plays a big part in energy conservation, i.e., Refrigerators with the freezers on top models use 20% less energy than side-by-side models. When replacing appliances, look for the Energy Star Label and also look for the Energy Guide. DO YOUR PART TO CUT DOWN ENERGY CONSUMPTION!

#### WHAT KIND OF TRASH DOES YOUR HOME MAKE?

Did you know that the Environmental Protection Agency states that containers and packaging are the single largest category making up 31% of the total municipal solid waste that goes to our city landfills?

Plastic and paper account for 65% of the packaging market. Homeowners should try to reuse boxes and packaging materials and this will reduce their climate impact. Also, we should try to recycle, which would result in a reduction of the greenhouse gases and energy.

### **HOW IS YOUR HOME'S WATER EFFICIENCY?**

Did you know that U.S. Indoor residential water use is estimated to average 80 gallons per person per day in homes without efficient fixtures; and if you have a large outdoor lawn, it could increase to 200 gallons per day? The average resident could save water painlessly. Replace your water-wasting fixtures with efficient state-of-the-art products. Redesign landscaping with drought-resistant plants that do not need water. By doing these easy changes, you can reduce your water and sewage bills and can limit your overall water consumption.

### ARE YOU RENOVATING OR BUILDING YOUR HOME?

Have you heard building green is one of the solutions to Global Warming? That is right, we need to build and construct building with our environment in mind. We need to be careful about what building materials we use. If we use local products, we can cut down on emissions of greenhouse gases. If we use recycled building materials such as wood from older homes, we can prevent the need to cut down trees. Design your building structure to have natural heating and cooling. Situate your building so that sunlight will come through the windows and breezes will blow through the windows for natural cooling. Wherever you can, incorporate solar energy to heat and cool the structure. By doing these plan alterations, we can reduce the effects on Global Warming and make the building structure have a positive style.

### WHAT CAN I DO TO FIGHT GLOBAL WARMING?


- 1. Change your light bulbs to a compact fluorescent bulb.
- 2. Maintain all your household equipment by cleaning them on a regular basis.
- 3. Use a hand push mower instead of an electric or gas mower to cut your grass. The only energy it uses is human energy and who knows, you can even become fit this way.
- 4. If you must use a gas mower, use a model that mulches clippings. You can reuse your clippings to mulch your flower beds or even make a compost pile that you can reuse and add into your soil for your garden or flower bed
- 5. If you are in the market to buy a new home or a new auto, choose one that requires less maintenance or gets high fuel mileage. Try to condense errands into fewer trips. Walk to the store and even pedal your bike around town.

IF everyone makes a few simple changes likes these, we can all do our share and trigger a powerful impact against Global Warming.






