The chief concern among residents in the Braddock District is speeding. It also happens to be a big problem in RF. Accompanying J.T. was John Bower who is a security and crime prevention consultant. We chatted after the meeting and he indicated our best odds to beat this scourge is to report the incidents by phone to the two-man task force (see below) the WSP District has dedicated to combating the problem. He said to collect as much evidence as possible but it's not required. The non-emergency number, 703-691-2131, is useful for reporting this. He said that due to the county's resource constraints (again, the economy) speed bumps would be very difficult to secure and stop signs are not the most effective tool. He also said that speed bumps damage vehicles and deteriorate over time from large trucks and snowplows. The task force is very much overwhelmed by all the needs so remember the squeaky wheel gets the grease! 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CRIME PREVENTION TIPS FROM WEST SPRINGFIELD'S CRIME PREVENTION UNIT

Vehicle Security:

- Lock all vehicle doors
- Remove valuables from vehicle
- Absolutely never leave a GPS device affixed to the windshield when not in use. Remove and store it in the console, glove box, or- better yet- inside a home.
- Lock your vehicle even when parked in a garage
- If your vehicle has an alarm, please activate it when the vehicle is not in use
- If you have an alarm service such as On-Star, Lojack, etc. please keep current on monthly fees
- Be familiar with your vehicle information (VIN, registration number, insurance carrier) should an incident occur
- Never leave your vehicle running without someone in the vehicle
- Never leave a spare key hidden within the vehicle
- Never leave a key in the ignition when the car is unattended

Home Security:

- Lock all doors and windows to the home when away (vacation, running errands, etc.). This also holds true at night when you are sleeping.
- If the home has an alarm system, please use it and change your alarm code every once in a while. Ensure the alarm is registered with the County.
- If you have an attached garage, please close the door. If on vacation, deactivate the automatic garage door opener.
- Lock all interior doors leading to the main house. This includes basement and garage doors.
- Use exterior lighting. Flood lights, motion detectors, and lamp posts are essential to deterrence.
- Trim bushes around windows.
- Do not leave valuables in plain view of a window, such as a purse on a table next to a door or window.
- If you "hide" a door key on the exterior of the home, be sure it is WELL hidden. It's better to give the key to a neighbor.
- If you have extension ladders in the tool shed, under a deck, etc, it's worth securing them with a lock.
- Secure all tool sheds. They are an easy source of tools with which to gain entry to your home.
- Be conscious of open second story windows, decks, or other means criminals may use to climb to a second story window.
- Make sure deadbolts are installed on exterior doors (single key, double key).
- Consider enhanced locking devices for sliding windows (pins).
- Get to know your neighbors and your neighborhood. Watch out for one another.
- If you notice suspicious persons or activity, call the non-emergency police number (703-691-2131) and report it.

SIGNS OF STROKE

Stroke is a leading cause of death in the United States. Over 800,000 people die in the U.S. each year from cardio-vascular disease and strokes. A stroke occurs when a clot blocks the blood supply to the brain or when a blood vessel in the brain bursts. Someone in the U.S. has a stroke every 40 seconds. Every four minutes someone dies of stroke. About 185,000 people who survive a stroke eventually have another.

Common stroke warning signs and symptoms include—

- Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm, or leg—especially on one side of the body.
- Sudden confusion, trouble speaking or understanding.
- Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes.
- Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination.
- Sudden severe headache with no known cause.

Some research suggests that non-medical people can recognize when someone may have had a stroke by asking the person to perform the S-T-R "test." S = smile, T = talk coherently, and R = raise both arms. If you or someone you're with experiences the above symptoms or cannot perform the simple steps of S-T-R, call 911 immediately. Stroke damage can be mitigated by immediate treatment. Don't pass the symptoms off as a temporary problem.

You can't control some stroke risk factors, such as heredity, age, gender, and ethnicity. Some medical conditions, including high blood pressure, high cholesterol, heart disease, diabetes, overweight or obesity, and previous stroke or transient ischemic attack (TIA), can raise your stroke risk. Not smoking, not drinking excessively, and getting exercise are all choices you can make to reduce your risk of stroke.

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TECH-DISTRACTED TEENS TWICE AS LIKELY TO GET HIT

Here's one more reason to put the phone away — and look twice before you cross the street, no matter how old you are. New research shows that teens are twice as likely as adults to get hit by a car because they were distracted by a phone or iPod. Eighteen percent of teen pedestrians hit by cars had been using a device versus nine percent of adults.

The study, presented at the American Academy of Pediatrics national conference, looked at the causes of pedestrian car accidents. Researchers studied 1,000 accidents finding that 13 percent of injured pedestrians were children. They found that 80 percent of teenagers had been unsupervised, and that jaywalking, darting into the street and using an electronic device were the most common culprits of accidents involving kids. Researchers call this type of distraction "inattentional blindness."

A past study published in the journal Injury Prevention found that accidents involving pedestrians wearing head-phones resulted in fatalities nearly three-quarters of the time. And then there's the hazard of driving while talking — or worse, texting.

Another study found that drivers on cell phones clog traffic and drive slower. And don't think hands-free devices are the answer — the conversation itself is the culprit. Reaction times for young adults become as slow as those of senior citizens, and drivers talking on cell phones are four times more likely to be in an accident.

The solution for safer cell phone use as a pedestrian is to simply wait until you are stationary. Keep your head up and eyes ahead — and keep headphones out of your ears. While driving, don't eat and avoid fiddling with the radio. Remember that you're operating a several-ton piece of metal with very precious cargo inside. And most importantly, definitely don't use your cell phone.

FAIRFAX BOARD OKS HOME DAY CARE CHANGES

William Callahan, writing on AnnandalePatch.com, Dec 4, 2012 Home day care centers in Fairfax County will soon become safer.

The Fairfax County Board of Supervisors has unanimously approved making changes to regulations on home day care centers, requiring more hours of training as well as fire safety measures.

During its recent meeting, the Board voted to adopt amendments to the Home Child Care Facilities Ordinance. Providers will now have to attend 16 hours of training instead of the original 12 and undergo tuberculosis screenings, as well as install carbon monoxide detectors to comply with county fire safety codes.

"These amendments reflect recommendations and input from a variety of county agencies and outline the best practices in the field," said Monica Jackson, speaking on behalf of the Child Care Advisory Council. "The proposed amendments are intended to support the health and safety of children and the council believes that the revision and further support that we are requesting will enhance the quality of care in our community."

The original amendments to the ordinance contained a requirement of a landline telephone, but Supervisor Pat Herrity (R-Springfield) successfully passed a motion to make it optional, arguing that cell phones were more practical, reliable and affordable.

"I continue to believe that the landline requirement is a cost that's not worth the benefit," he said, noting that it could cost providers up to \$500 a year.

Supervisor Jeff McKay (D-Lee) agreed. "My main concern is with, especially the smaller childcare centers we have, it is a significant cost," McKay said. "It's not as if there isn't another technology available ... I haven't had a landline in my house for probably 15 years." But Supervisor Cathy Hudgins (D-Hunter Mill) said that the safety of kids was more important than the cost of the landlines.

Fire officials said that when a 911 call comes in from a landline, an address for the call automatically pops up on the emergency operator's computer screen, making it easier for safety personnel to locate the call. There's currently no similar service for cell phones, fire officials said.

Supervisors said that home day care providers could certainly have landlines in their homes, but the Board just didn't want to say that they had to.

Herrity's amendment to make landlines optional passed 6-3. Hudgins, Penny Gross (D-Mason) and Linda Smyth (D-Providence) voted against the amendment. Supervisor Gerry Hyland (D-Mount Vernon) was absent from the meeting.

The Board did not discuss changes to the number of children a home day care facility is allowed to have, a topic of hot debate over the summer. It is expected to come up in 2013.

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
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
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
