FROM THE PRESIDENT

Besides representing us on the Braddock District Council, I'm also on supervisor Cook's Braddock Road Widening Committee. The landmark transportation bill Governor McDonnell signed into law on February 23, 2013 put the state on a path to improving its badly underfunded transportation needs. It has state and local/regional components to it. Without getting into the minutia of how it works- one of the long-delayed projects that now will receive funding is the widening of Braddock from Guinea to the beltway. We had a good discussion on this topic with a lot of input at our last general membership meeting which I will be taking to the committee. I will also provide updates through the Farmer, Website, and Facebook page as it evolves. As of this writing, the plans are still up in the air because Supervisor Cook is in the process of soliciting feedback and discussing alternatives. This will continue for a few months. A few of the concerns we discussed are sound barriers between the homes along Adair and Braddock, improved safety and travel for the path between Queensberry and the shopping center, as well as a bike path from Burke Lake Road to Queensberry.



WHAT TO DO ABOUT SINKHOLES

There are quite a few sinkholes in the neighborhood that are the result of the gas line renovation work being done by Washington Gas and their contractor, NPL. When you see such a sinkhole, please fill it and call Washington Gas at 703-750-1000 to report the sinkhole so they can watch for pipe failure from lack of pipe support in the ground.

Use dirt from around the hole or from other locations in your yard to fill the sinkhole. If the adjacent soil is above the level of the sidewalk, you can skim off the few inches above that level and put that dirt in the hole. Clay soil is better that mulch or bagged soil for this type of fill because it has less organic matter and less air space. Most of our neighborhood is clay soil just below the surface of our grass.

The newly exposed soil adjacent to the hole should be leveled with the sidewalk and reseeded with grass. Depending on current height of the grass area, a gentle slope may be needed to avoid a tripping hazard. The final level can be just at, above or below the sidewalk level. I designed my area to be just below the sidewalk at a very gentle slope to retain the stormwater so it does not rush down to Lake Accotink but is absorbed by my yard first. Heavy rains will overflow to the lake but regular rains will go into the ground.

The problem occurs because a hole filled with loose dirt typically has 50% new air spaces between the dirt. Over time the soil settles to less than 50% air space and most often sinks when rain collapses some of the air spaces. This can happen several times during rain events. If there is a larger air space below the soil surface than rain water can create a sink hole as it collapses that larger air space. Each time it should be filled to prevent it from getting larger.

RAVENSWORTH ES RENOVATION PLAN

Many interested teachers, parents, and school staff gathered in the Ravensworth Elementary School cafeteria to learn more about the \$15+ million renovation the school is undergoing.

Larry Levato, the project architect, began by sharing artists' drawings of how the school will look around March 2016 after the 22-month renovation. Brady Rauch, FCPS Coordinator of Capital Projects and Jay Zayas, FCPS Construction Manager for the Ravensworth renovation shared timelines and details of how construction will impact the school and community.

At the end of the renovation, the school will be able to handle 600 students. Current enrollment is approximately 550 students. This project is not an expansion. It is only a renovation. Renovation designs are done based on a five-year projection of student demographics.

Construction will commence in late April or early May with the arrival of fencing and construction trailers on the site of the existing modular classrooms. The speakers stressed that nothing in the school will be untouched by the end of the project. Plumbing, heating, electrical, lights, and all other systems will be completely up to code. The air exchange will meet or exceed current code. New power will be supplied to the building in order to handle the requirements of the upgraded HVAC and technology needs. FCPS generally has renovations of seven to 11 elementary schools underway at any given time. This is a routine project for FCPS' Design and Construction team.

The new wing of the building will be located on portions of the existing parking lot, the yard area containing the gazebo and some part of where the existing modular classrooms sit. It will complete the triangle begun by the existing wings. The new wing will be completed first in order to move students into it while the old classroom areas are completely renovated. That wing will take about 13 months to complete. There will also be a new, secure vestibule that will not allow daytime visitors access to the school without walking through the office. Extended Kiss & Ride space will allow more cars to pick up and drop off at a time in front of the new lobby but the traffic pattern will remain similar to the current pattern.

After Spring Break 2014, the older Ravensworth students will transition down the hill into the new modular class-rooms that have been set up on part of the playing field. The youngest students will move from their part of the hallway into other parts of the building. The new wing will connect to the old wing at the end of the youngest students' hallway.

At all times, safety and a good learning environment will be priority for the contractor. FCPS' oversight team includes an air quality specialist who will ensure that the requirement of indoor air quality being 500 times better than OSHA's standard is met. FCPS also has a safety consultant on the team. Shutdowns of electricity, plumbing, HVAC, and other systems will occur before and after school as will the worst of the noise-generating activities. On scheduled testing days, the contractors will mute the noise still more. Contractors will not be in the student-occupied parts of the buildings during the school day. There will be some excitement for the students such as when a huge crane will be used to remove and reposition beams in the library roof. When students return to school in the fall, they will notice that the hallways do not have ceiling tiles. This will be in order to give the contractors access to all the systems. The fire suppression sprinklers will remain active throughout the construction.

FCPS will have a full-time field representative at the construction site. This person will serve as the liaison between the school and the general contractor, which appears likely to be Pavone Construction of Manassas. There will be progress meetings between the school and the contractor every two weeks. If you have concerns about how construction is going, they can be directed to Principal Salata or her designee and can be brought up in meetings with the contractor.

While classes will continue during the regular school year, there will not be summer school at Ravensworth for summer 2014 and summer 2015. Students will be bussed to another school for summer programs.

Fairfax County arborists assessed the many trees on the school lot and recommended some for removal. At the end of the project, there will be more plantings than are currently on the property. A combination of deciduous and evergreen trees is planned to screen between neighbors' properties and the school.

Also present were Roxanne Salata, Ravensworth Principal; Megan McLaughlin, Braddock District school board member; and Angela Atwater, Cluster 6 Superintendent.

Ms. Salata noted that, as part of a unit on advocacy, the Ravensworth fourth graders had presented her with a petition to install a sixth grade-only bathroom on the roof of the new building with access to be provided through a window. The fourth graders felt this would solve the issue of messes the sixth graders make in the bathroom. Unfortunately, Mr. Levato, the architect, said that the constructions plans do not call for such a bathroom. Much to the delight of the teachers, the plans do call for teacher restrooms and workrooms on each level of the building.

Fox Fire Grill opened in 2003. According to the owner Terri Fox, "Our goal is to provide exceptional food and wine in a casual, stylish setting at affordable prices. We offer unique appetizers, seasonal salads, fresh seafood, and of course grilled steaks and burgers."

We arrived on a busy weeknight and were quite surprised to find such a warm, inviting, upscale and friendly environment. We were told the wait shouldn't be long and were asked if we wanted to wait in the bar area, we agreed and were ushered up to the bar and introduced to Adam. Adam, the lead bartender (mixologist), greeted us with a smile and warmth as if we were already regulars. He assured us the wait wouldn't be long as he began to discuss the drink specials and wines. DON'T BE A CLOG - HAVE A PLAN

Bruce McFarlane, an emergency planning and outreach analyst with the Fairfax County Office of Emergency Management, spoke at the March 27 meeting of the Ravensworth Civic Association.

When explaining where Emergency Management kicks in, Mr. McFarlane said that medical, fire, police, and emergency management are four legs of a table. Eighty to 90 percent of all incidents happen and are managed locally. Emergency Management kicks in when local resources are overextended. He pointed out that Fairfax County is in an ideal situation due to the many cooperation agreements in place between the County and surrounding counties and states. When Arlington County's fire and rescue personnel were all occupied at the Pentagon in September 2001, Fairfax County backfilled for them in all the day-to-day incidents in Arlington and Prince William County backfilled Fairfax County. During the "Snowmaggedon" events of February 2010, the Office of Emergency Management (OEM) coordinated Virginia National Guard assistance in transporting emergency and medical personnel to and from work in their Humvees.

Mr. McFarlane also pointed out that there are 1.1 million people in Fairfax County. The County has 1,300 First Responders spread across three shifts. He recommended that you do the math and figure out the likelihood that First Responders would get to you if there were a major event. He then insisted that each family create a comprehensive family plan. He recommended the customizable template at www.ReadyNOVA.org for developing your family plan.

Developing a plan includes creating and reviewing the plan as a family, assembling various emergency kits (house, car, and office), and staying informed. You can register for the Community Emergency Alert Network (CEAN) to receive emergency and serious traffic alerts via email, text, or cell phone. You can also access emergency information via the County's Facebook and Twitter feeds, the County's emergency blog (fairfaxcounty.gov/emergency/blog), and NOAA Weather Radio.

In addition to the basics above, every family should assess their special needs such as disabilities and the need for medications. Those with medical needs can sign up on the OEM's Medical Needs Registry so that the County will get in touch in the event of catastrophes and evacuate the persons with medical needs. This was used during the derecho event to find homebound people with medical needs who didn't have power and needed it for dialysis and oxygen.

Mr. McFarlane stressed that "What clogs government response to an emergency are not the people who can't help themselves but the people who could have had a plan and didn't." In addition to having plans for your immediate family, you should have a plan for your pets and the caretakers and adult children of older folks should know the needs, problems, and medications of their seniors in order to plan with and for them.

OEM's operations center across from Costco at Rt. 29 and West Ox Road has food and water to be self-sustaining for up to 30 days. You may not need as much but you should be prepared for several days.

Most emergencies in Fairfax County so far have been weather related. Fairfax County is fortunate to have the National Weather Service located here in Sterling. The OEM has cultivated a very good relationship with that office

and generally has advance warning of events. In many cases, the safety question is, "Should I stay or should I go?" The answer is, "Get where you need to be before the storm hits." In some cases, sheltering in place wherever you are is a better plan than being on the road. A thermonuclear detonation will cause a flash equivalent to 1,000 suns. This would be blinding for several minutes. Imagine the car crashes among all the blinded drivers who hit the road instead of sheltering in place.

Instead of feeling that you must rush to personally "save" each member of your family, get to know the safety plans for their schools and workplaces. Encourage each place to have a solid plan and practice it. Then leave it to those in charge to take care of your scattered family while you take care of yourself and others nearby- something you can do because of your excellent prior planning!

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












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
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
