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

SUPER TUESDAY ELECTIONS

It may seem a long time ago but 48% of Ravensworth's registered voters turned out March 1 to make their wishes known in the Super Tuesday presidential primaries. Two simultaneous elections- one of Democratic presidential candidates and one of Republican presidential candidates- were presided over at the Ravensworth Precinct by Chief Judge Edwana "Doddie" Cave and Assistant Chief Judge Norman Van Dam without a wrinkle. Doddie, Ruth Hartman, and Virginia Rogers continued their longest-in-the-county streaks as election officers.

There was a brief nine-person line at one point in the afternoon. Otherwise, the wait to check in and vote was very short. Throughout the day, besides voting, neighbors greeted each other and caught up on their own and their children's activities. In addition, many people took the opportunity to check out the brand-new school lobby and the beautiful renovation of the cafeteria.

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
LAKE ACCOTINK PLAN REVISIONS

The Fairfax County Park Authority has begun the process to revise the Master Plan for Lake Accotink Park. The planning process will help guide the future of this well-loved park and the Park Authority would like to hear your opinion. To kick off the planning, a public information meeting was held on March 14, 2016 at Cardinal Forest Elementary School. Why revise Lake Accotink Park' Master Plan that was approved in 1993?

A master plan revision is undertaken when a park or its surrounding community have notably changed. This is the case of the Lake Accotink Park Master Plan.

The Lake Accotink Park master plan was first developed in 1964. It has been revised several times over the years, most recently in 1993. The 1993 Conceptual Development Plan reflected the existing marina, concessions stand, and parking areas. The plan also envisioned additional space devoted for family picnics, restrooms, and expanded parking. The carousel was planned to remain with the addition of a new playground and expanded mini-golf in the lakefront area. These facilities have been added while



some, such as a boat landing on the west side of the lake and a ball field, have not been constructed. Additional improvements have also been made to enhance accessibility.

Fairfax County's demographics have changed since 1993. The population has increased 37% between 1993 and 2015, from 818,584 residents to 1,125,385 residents. And the county's population is predicted to grow by another 12% by the year 2030. Along the way, the average age of Fairfax County residents is increasing. More and more residents are living in townhomes or multifamily buildings without the benefit of a traditional backyard for recreation. Demographics are shifting and so are recreational preferences. The relationship of outdoor recreation to health and well-being increases the demand for park space and suggests opportunities for park changes. At the same time, some of the existing park facilities that have served the community for a long time are showing their age. The master plan revision will allow an opportunity to examine existing facilities in light of these changes.

Suburban development upstream of the lake since 1965 has resulted in the recurrent and increasing rate of siltation in the lake. The siltation has reduced the surface area of Lake Accotink as well as the depth to approximately three to five feet deep. Increased siltation degrades the health of the lake, reducing populations of fish, invertebrates, and bottom communities while providing a conduit for pollutants. As a recreational lake, the reduced depth impacts boating operations and the impacted fish population reduces the lake's attractiveness for recreational fishing.

The lake was dredged in 1984 and 2004 and will need dredging again within the next decade. Examination of options for addressing the continued accumulation of silt, which impacts the health and recreational value of the lake, will be a key focus of the master plan revision process.

In addition, Fairfax County has greatly expanded its approach to watershed management planning and the Accotink Watershed Plan will be an important policy guide for considering lake sustainability options. The master plan revision provides an opportunity to align the park master plan with watershed planning objectives.

Park circulation, site operational needs, access, natural resource management, history and archaeology will all be reviewed as part of the master plan revision. Site analysis will examine ways to encourage safe bike and pedestrian routes, to and within the park, while easing vehicular movements. Additional park land use and resource management issues and concerns identified by the public, park users and stakeholders will also be examined as part of the master plan process.

GEM REVIEW - FLEDGLINGS

We moved to Ravensworth Farm too late in the summer of 2011 to join the pool. As we met neighbors through the winter, we heard great things of the pool and how easy it would be to find friends for our then four-year-old daughter if we joined. We were told we would especially make friends with younger kids and parents if we joined something called Fledglings. They said Fledglings was swim lessons. Our daughter had already taken swim lessons at various REC Centers but we were going to join the pool anyway and it is just blocks from our house so we signed her up. We figured she probably wouldn't advance more than she had done in her REC lessons.

Boy, were we wrong! It's amazing what a four-year-old can learn in four concentrated weeks of five lessons per week! It's extra-helpful that the coaches are "big kids" that the little kids really want to impress. After her first summer of Fledglings, our daughter had conquered the shallow end. After her second summer, the deep end held no fear (or danger). After her third summer, she won her event in her first swim meet. She became a fully-fledged Ravens Swim Team member for her fourth summer alongside many of her previous Fledglings coaches. Now, she's waiting to turn 13 and be a junior Fledglings coach herself. Only five years to go! (Oh, and we made a lot of friends at the pool.)



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COUNTY EXECUTIVE RELEASES PROPOSED FY 17 BUDGET

Yesterday, the County Executive presented his proposed Fiscal Year 2017 Advertised Budget Plan to the Board of Supervisors. Over the next six weeks, my colleagues and I will be discussing this plan with the community. We are very early in the process, and I look forward to working with all residents to create and pass a fiscally responsible budget that meets the needs of Fairfax County.

The Fiscal Realities:

The County Executive's budget, as proposed, is balanced. However, to do so, would require a real estate tax increase of \$0.03 per \$100 of assessed valuation. To meet future needs, the County Executive is recommending a tax increase of \$0.04, raising the total real estate tax to \$1.13 per \$100 of assessed valuation. As a result, under the County Executive's proposed increase of \$0.04, the average county homeowner would pay \$303.86 more in property taxes.

The area's real estate market is recovering, but slowly. The average price of homes sold rose only about 1.1 percent. Homes remained on the market longer than they did in 2014. Residential assessments have increased an average of 1.64 percent this year - growing at about half the rate of FY 2016.

The national economy is continuing its economic recovery, but the county's economy continues to underperform. Fortunately, commercial assessments are beginning to improve after declining for two consecutive years, and as of 2015, Fairfax County job growth is 0.9 percent. While this is an improvement over 2014, it still lags behind the national averages. Moreover, the cornerstone of the local economy - federal government procurement - has yet to recover from the effects of sequestration.

As jobs are lost or expansions are delayed, the real estate footprints of companies shrink as well. Consequently, this stalled labor market is, in turn, impacting the commercial real estate market. According to the Fairfax County Economic Development Authority, the direct office vacancy rate was 16.5 percent at mid-year 2015, up from 16.3 percent at year-end 2014. This is the highest office vacancy rate since 1991 when the rate was 16.8 percent. The overall effect is a significant reduction in commercial tax revenue.

It was within this very challenging and constrained reality that the County Executive made his recommendations.

Budget Summary:

On the whole, the County Executive's proposed budget would increase General Fund Disbursements by roughly \$168 million, or 4.42 percent, over the FY 2016 Adopted Budget Plan. The two main expenditure increases are:

- Funding for operations of Fairfax County Public Schools (FCPS) is increased by \$70.57 million. This would be a 3.0 percent increase over last year. In addition, the County also provides support to FCPS in the amount of \$84.7 million for other school services including Head Start, school health, resource officers and crossing guards, after-school programming, field maintenance and recreational programs. The proposed General Fund transfer for school operations, infrastructure and debt service totals 2.08 billion in FY 2017, which is an increase of 3.51 percent from FY 2016 Adopted Budget. The Fairfax County School Board recently requested an operating transfer of \$1.95 billion for FY 2017 to help decrease class sizes & provide raises to school employees. This would require a 6.7 percent increase over the FY 2016 Adopted Budget and would require an additional \$68 million, or a \$0.03 increase in the Real Estate Tax Rate above that recommended by the County Executive.
- Approximately \$43 million is advertised for employee compensation increases. This would provide longevity and performance increases for qualifying general county and public safety employees, and a 1.33 percent Market Rate Adjustment.
- Reserves require an additional \$15.58 million and ten percent of FY 2017 Disbursement increases will be held in reserve.

- 13.6 million in reductions, including the elimination of 17 positions. The full reduction list can be found online.
- Support for human services, public safety, and economic initiatives

Further details are available online.

The first step in the budget process will occur on March 1st when the Board sets the Advertised Tax Rate. Under state law, the Board cannot increase the tax rate after it is advertised (but can lower it.) For that reason, and because I have not yet decided how to vote on the advertised rate, your input is crucial. Please contact me at brad-dock@fairfaxcounty.gov with your thoughts on this point.

Regardless of what rate is advertised, I and the Board will both be looking for additional reductions and other opportunities for savings as well as reviewing the County Executive's proposed reductions, to see if some should be restored.


