PRESIDENT'S LETTER

Friends, Farmers, Neighbors:

Join us on October 18 at 7:30pm in the Ravensworth Elementary School cafeteria for a detailed discussion regarding Lake Accotink and its future. Many of you have expressed ongoing concern about Lake Accotink and have asked about the current status of Save Lake Accotink's efforts. While there is still much to be done and the matter is far from decided, we need not worry as we have. Before I give an update on the current status of Lake Accotink, I shall provide a very brief summary of the issues and events to date. For a more complete explanation and discussion of Lake Accotink, please attend the Ravensworth Farm Civic Association General Membership Meeting on October 18.

The Fairfax County Park Authority has been undertaking the process of revising the Lake Accotink Park Master Plan. This process began in 2016, and at some point in that process, several options for the future of the lake were proposed. Some of these options got rid of the lake altogether, and it seemed the Park Authority favored those options that removed the lake entirely. Other options included creating a smaller lake and maintaining the lake in its current form through continued dredging.

In January of this year, 2018, I began to raise the alarm, and at an emergency meeting of the Ravensworth Farm Civic Association held in February, a number of our

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wonderful neighbors, including Tyler Small, Vikram Shrivastava, Scott Houghton, Phil Baxter, Shane Shroeder, Mike Field of North Springfield, and I formed the non-profit Save Lake Accotink. Later, Stephanie Hopkins, Richard Hildebrand, and Barbara Coder of Crestwood's Springfield joined our efforts. Since we began the campaign to save Lake Accotink, thousands have joined the efforts, donating money, posting yard signs, attending meetings and events, signing our petition, and sharing our message with the community.

Save Lake Accotink has supported only one of the options proposed, designated "Option C" by the Park Authority. Option C is a full dredge of the lake with the addition of a forebay, which will catch most of the sediment plaguing the lake before it gets to the main body of the lake. While this is the most expensive of all the options, Save Lake Accotink determined that, when external costs are included in the cost-benefit analysis, Option C is actually by far the least expensive of all the options. Due to the requirements of clean water regulations to reduce the amount of sediment discharged by Accotink Creek and the value Lake Accotink provides to Fairfax County's efforts to comply with its regulatory obligations, Option C will, in the long run, save Fairfax County money. Braddock District Supervisor John Cook later confirmed the accuracy of Save Lake Accotink's cost-benefit analysis.

On June 5, 2018, Lee District Supervisor Jeff McKay, Springfield District Supervisor Pat Herrity, and Mason District Supervisor Penny Gross joined Supervisor Cook in the presentation to the Board of Supervisors of Save Lake Accotink's petition of 4,168 signatures in support of a bond referendum to fund Option C. During the discussion of that petition presentation Chairman Sharon Bulova expressed emphatic support of Option C. Since then, other county supervisors have expressed support for saving Lake Accotink.

It appears now that Option C is the only option left on the table. The Park Authority has engaged an engineering firm to conduct further studies and proposed designs for Option C, a full dredge of Lake Accotink with the addition of a forebay, which may be located either at Braddock Road or at the head of the lake itself.

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County Supervisors, the Park Authority, and the Department of Public Works and Environmental Services are studying options for funding Option C. No matter where the county finds funding for the project, much of the funding will have to come from a bond. We anticipate the inclusion of a special bond on the November 2019 ballot. As that election approaches, Save Lake Accotink will campaign for the bond referendum. We ask that everyone keep abreast of the efforts and join Save Lake Accotink in its bond campaign.

With all the activity surrounding Lake Accotink, the rest of the Lake Accotink Park Master Plan Revision has been placed on hold. I am now working with Friends of Lake Accotink Park to develop a community vision for the future of the entire park and will be working with other civic associations to gain input to and endorsements of this community vision, which will address the improvements we would like to be included in the revised park master plan.

If you have suggested improvements to any part of the park, whether transportation infrastructure, recreation facilities at the marina or other areas of the park, educational features, wildlife viewing areas, or any other park features please send those suggestions to me in an email and please send those suggestions to the Park Authority at parkmail@fairfaxcounty.gov. If there are any features you do not want to change, please express those wishes as well.

What a pleasure it has been to see my neighbors respond to the needs of the community! I look forward with confidence to our future efforts and ask everyone to consider ways you can contribute more. I have seen what we can accomplish when we get involved and hope we'll each catch the vision that I have for civic engagement in Ravensworth Farm.

Thank you for making Ravensworth Farm such a great community. And thanks in advance for your future efforts to further improve the lives of your neighbors.

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








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GREEN THUMB GARDEN CLUB

NEW RULES FOR SHORT-TERM LODGING

On July 31, the Board of Supervisors voted 7 to 3 to approve new rules that for the first time allow homes to be rented out as short-term lodging (STL) through websites such as Airbnb. We heard from people on both sides of this issue.



I believe we need to be responsive to what people want to do with their homes while at the same time protect the character and residential nature of our neighborhoods. The best way to reduce the impact of activities such as STL is to enforce the existing zoning occupancy laws. Our Zoning Ordinance is not perfect, but it is a set of consistent rules that are in place to make sure that communities remain stable and that people are able to enjoy the use of their property.

I offered an amendment to require that when a property is used for STL, occupancy would be limited to the same number of people provided for in the county's Zoning Ordinance. The Zoning Ordinance limits occupancy of a dwelling unit to: one family with up to two unrelated roomers or boarders; two single parents or guardians with not more than a total of six of their children; or a group of not more than four unrelated persons functioning as a single housekeeping unit. I believe that the same rules should be in place for someone who chooses to rent their house as short-term lodging. Why should the rules for the same house change depending on who is occupying it that particular day? My amendment also would have required that all areas used for sleeping be in compliance with all applicable code regulations, particularly with regard to the requirements for adequate ingress/egress from sleeping areas, including basements. Unfortunately, my amendment was not adopted by the Board of Supervisors, which chose to set the occupancy limit at six adults. Because the Board's motion did not support our Zoning Ordinance, I voted against the final motion.

The new rules will go into effect on October 1, 2018. Residents will be able to rent out their single-family homes, townhouses, condos, mobile homes, apartments, or rooms therein for up to 60 days a year, with some limitations. They must apply for a new \$200, two-year permit. The number of guests will be limited to six adults, who must all be associated with the same rental contract. One designated parking space must be available for lodgers. Properties may not be rented for events or commercial purposes, like parties, weddings, or fundraisers. Residents who offer their homes for STL will be required to pay transient occupancy taxes.

County staff will report back to the Board 18 months from the effective date on how the system is working, including: the number of STL permits issued and how that number compares to activity data provided by Host Compliance; the amount of tax revenue received; the number, nature, and disposition of complaints received related to STL uses; whether there should be a Special Permit or Special Exception process to expand STL uses beyond what is currently provided for; whether additional resources are needed to adequately address the permitting and enforcement of STL uses; and whether any privacy-related concerns or incidences have been reported to county staff.

KEEP LOOKING WHEN COOKING

According to the Fairfax County Office of Emergency Management, preparing and cooking food is the leading cause of home fires and related burn injuries.

Unattended cooking accounts for 33 percent of these types of fires. Planning ahead, however, can reduce your risk for a kitchen fire. Here are some useful cooking tips:

- Be attentive and alert while cooking
- Keep your stove area clear of towels, papers, pot holders—anything that can burn
- Enforce a "kid free zone" around your stove
- Turn handles inward to prevent small hands from knocking over hot pans
- Unplug appliances when not in use
- Keep a fire extinguisher handy

"In addition to these tips, we always stress the importance of properly installed and maintained smoke alarms," says Courtney Arroyo, Emergency Management. "It may sound trite, but smoke alarms do save lives and doubles your chances of surviving a fire." She also advices that having a fire extinguisher handy is always a good idea.

She emphatically states that once a fire starts at home, get out and call 911. Do not go back into a burning building—no matter what. GARDEN MYTH: IMPROVING DRAINAGE WITH GRAVEL

Myth: Put gravel or rocks in the bottom of containers to improve drainage.

Reality: This long-held gardening belief is based on the idea that gravel or rocks at the base of a container will allow water to move more freely from top to bottom, thus preventing the plants' roots from becoming waterlogged. Ironically, the exact opposite occurs.

According to Dr. Linda Chalker-Scott, extension horticulturist and associate professor at Washington State University, "Gravitational water will not move from a finely textured soil into a coarser material until the finer soil is saturated." In other words, the soil in the container behaves like a sponge. It fills with water, but the water won't drip through until the soil reaches maximum capacity. As a result, a person may unintentionally overwater a container plant, believing that the water is moving through the soil and draining out over the gravel, when, in fact, it is not. Consistently overwatering a plant will most likely lead to root rot, which generally causes plant death. So how do you improve drainage in a container?

- All planting containers should have drainage holes at the bottom which allow for root aeration.
- If the container is large or deep, place empty, sealed plastic beverage bottles at the bottom to take up space. This will reduce the amount of planting medium required. Avoid Styrofoam, though, as roots can penetrate it, and a plant in Styrofoam can float out of the container.
- Use a high-quality potting mix and combine small amounts of leaf mold, compost and topsoil throughout the mix.
- If using a heavier garden soil or topsoil, add perlite to create a lighter mix that will improve drainage.

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FEEDBACK NEEDED ON PROPOSED PUBLIC SAFETY DRONE PROGRAM

On July 31, the Board of Supervisors unanimously voted to defer both the purchase of six to eight drones by the Police Department and approval of a drone policy manual to allow time for community input on the use of drones by law enforcement and other first responders.

County staff discussed the concept of drone use by police, fire and emergency management groups with the Public Safety Committee, which Supervisor Cook chairs, in January. However, the full policy manual was not released until shortly before the Board meeting. Supervisor Cook noted that the law



is in flux with regard to information gathered from drone use and expressed concern about the civil rights implications for citizens. He stated at the meeting that people tend to think that they have privacy in their backyard, and they won't necessarily have that if police and prosecutors can use video gathered by drones over private property to support criminal prosecutions. For this reason, Supervisor Cook supported a delay to allow time for more conversations with privacy advocates, homeowners' associations, and civic groups.

The purpose of the public safety drone program is to assist first responders with situations that may benefit from a remote view. Drones could be helpful in search and rescue missions, emergency operations, police investigations, hazardous material situations, and infrastructure assessments. Although there are many potential benefits, there are also concerns.

Public input on this issue is critical. The Board hopes to revisit the use of drones by public safety agencies in December, with potential adjustments to better protect the privacy of Fairfax County citizens. 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PRESERVE OLD PHOTOS, VHS, ETC FREE

Remember back in the day, before you (or your parents) took photos and videos on a smartphone and you had boxes of prints, slides and VHS cassettes? Many of us have boxes of those family histories and memories tucked away in our basements and attics. Now is the time to pull out those dusty boxes and put your photos, videos and documents in digital format – the Library has launched the free Memory Depot at two locations, the City of Fairfax Regional Library and Sherwood Regional Library.

Preserving Memories

Memory Depot is a free way to digitize your old photos and videos!

The Memory Depot is a do-it-yourself (DIY) station, which enables you to digitize material, including:

- VHS video cassettes.
- Photographic prints, negatives and slides.
- Scrapbooks and other documents.
- And audio cassettes are coming soon!

When you are ready to get started, you will need to bring with you:

- The materials you want to digitize.
- An external hard drive or a USB with capacity for your materials to be saved digitally.
- Your library card.

Sign Up for 30-minute Orientation

We strongly recommend that you sign up for an orientation before registering for a session at the Memory Depot. Remember, it is a do-it-yourself project!

The orientations show you how the Memory Depot stations work, including the scanner station (photos and documents) and the VHS transfer station (video cassettes). While registration is for either the scanner station or the VHS transfer station, our orientations will cover all available equipment in a single session.

Sign up for your orientation:

City of Fairfax Regional Library: Orientations are Thursdays and Saturdays at 10:15 a.m. Sign up in person at the Virginia Room Information Desk or by calling the Virginia Room at 703-293-6227, ext. 6 (TTY 711) or through our events calendar.

Sherwood Regional Library:

Orientations are Wednesdays at 10:15 a.m. Sign up in person at the Tech Lab Information Desk or call the Sherwood Information Desk at 703-765-3645, ext. 4 (TTY 711) and ask for the Tech Lab.

Get Started!

When you sign up to use the Memory Depot, you will be signing up to use one station at a time. You can register for a session to use either the scanner for photographs, slides, negatives and other archival documents or to use the VHS transfer station. Reservations are limited to one session per day and no more than two per week; reservations may be booked as much as 30 days ahead of time. You may reserve a session for a minimum of one hour, but no more than three hours.
