LETTER FROM ALLAN ROBERTSON

My dear fellow Farmers:

My time as president of the Ravensworth Farm Civic Association has been extremely gratifying and uplifting. It has been a pleasure and a privilege to serve the community alongside so many wonderful neighbors.

Ravensworth Farm Civic Association exists to promote the well-being of those who live within the Ravensworth Farm subdivision. RFCA promotes community and unity. From day to day, that means working to create and maintain welcomeness, positive relationships among neighbors, environmental health, and positive public image for the neighborhood.

RFCA also provides vital government relations. As president, I always sought to first empower my neighbors to meet their own needs. When individual's efforts fail, RFCA can add a measure of gravitas that encourages the needed government actions. For example, when neighbors complain to VDOT about potholes and damaged or obstructed sidewalks, VDOT usually fixes the problems within a reasonable amount of time. In such cases, RFCA is available to escalate the complaints, and, in this case, all the reported issues were quickly addressed.

Did you miss the April, May, and June issues of The Ravensworth Farmer? Due to the March closure of the Key Center School, where our copies of The Farmer are normally printed, we couldn't print The Ravensworth Farmer. The April, May, and June issues were published digital-only and, along with all previous Farmers, are posted on the Civic Association website at http://www.ravensworthfarm.org/farmer-2/. If you don't have online access, ask your neighbor with access to print them out for you.

Until the Vocational Training students from the Key Center School are able to return full-time to the classroom, the Civic Association board is trying out an online vendor to print and collate The Farmer. The value that the non-profit Key Center is able to supply in printing is considerably more than what a for-profit company would charge the Civic Association. In order to stay anywhere near our previous costs and still provide a printed copy of The Ravensworth Farmer on the doorstep of every neighbor the format of The Farmer has had to change.

Neighbors who've been here awhile say The Farmer has reverted to an older format. They recall "parties" where they caught up on neighborhood happenings as they collated The Farmer by walking around a table in a neighbor's basement, picking up a mimeographed page at a time, adding it to their stack, and stapling the completed stack to make a copy of The Farmer.



I even went to North Carolina to participate in Black protest marches at a time when I was one of the only white girls in the march. So much more, too. Neat memories. And, I'm full of hope for the present!

NEIGHBORS INVOLVED IN FOOD DISTRIBUTION EFFORTS

In March, Scott Houghton, a chef and Ravensworth Farm resident, went from occasional volunteer to big time grocery shopper for Annandale United Methodist Church's Mission Center when grocery store supplies decreased even as demand at the Mission Center increased. Almost immediately after pandemic restrictions went into force, the Mission Center, located at 7901 Heritage Drive in Annandale within walking distance of 1,500 lower-income housing units, jumped from providing food to around 45 people each week to serving 200.

The church's leaders worried about exposing their mostly senior citizen volunteers to the coronavirus but also worried about serving the increasing need in the community. That's, when Bill Sinclair, Ravensworth Farm resident and long-time volunteer with the Mission Center, recruited Scott to put his chef expertise in large-scale sourcing of food and management of a commercial food operation to use on behalf of the Mission Center. Initially, in the days of reduced grocery store supply, Scott visited multiple Walmart locations and other grocery stores each week just to get enough to supply the food distribution. Now that supplies have leveled out, he is mostly responsible for Thursday runs to Restaurant Depot to purchase 210 dozen eggs, 80 small French breads, 20 to 40 one-pound boxes of pasta, and as many 15 ounce cans of black or kidney beans as the wholesaler has in stock.

Since those in need of food can no longer come inside to "shop" for their groceries, Betsy Clevenger, the Mission Center's food distribution manager, used what the Center had learned in providing "backpack meals" for school children to plan and pack family bag meals. Each person over the age of 18 who comes between 5:00 and 6:00 pm on Thursdays receives one brown paper shopping bag of groceries, no questions asked. The bags include ingredients for a family meal – such as pasta and spaghetti sauce – a box of cereal, canned vegetables, canned beans, canned fruit, mac and cheese, peanut butter and jelly, and a can of chunky soup. In addition to nonperishable items, each person receives eggs, some fresh produce, and a half-gallon of milk. Scott says people get a bit more produce in the fall, as so many crops are in season.

The food arrives at the Mission Center by many different routes. Annandale United Methodist Church (AUMC) purchases much of the food, both from grocery stores and what Scott buys at Restaurant Depot. The church funds the food purchases through their Lenten Mission Fund, individual donations, and a Covid relief grant they received early on from Fairfax County. Swiss Bakery and Panera donate leftover bread. Food for Others provides some produce. Individuals and groups donate food items. All the food must be specific unit sizes and types in order to fit the maximum amount of food into the brown paper bags. According to Scott, donations of standard-sized cans of fruit, 15-ounce cans of black or kidney beans (no pork and beans), and 3-5 ounce cans of tuna "never accumulate on the shelves" as they are very popular inclusions in the grocery bags. The Mission Center also accepts donations of paper shopping bags with handles (such as those from Whole Foods) and styrofoam or cardboard (but not plastic) dozen-size egg cartons. To see pictures of some of the packed bags and to find out the week's menu and specific donation needs, search out the Facebook page for AUMC Mission Center.

After all the shopping is done, volunteers pack the grocery bags. In addition to groceries, volunteers, including Ravensworth Farm's Maribeth Day, also put together "surprise packages" of six children's clothing items of the same size to hand out to families twice a month. Sometimes, depending on donations, there may be diapers or feminine hygiene products available, too.

On Thursdays, the line of those in need of support begins to form about 4:00pm and extends around the corner by the time distribution begins at 5:00pm. The volunteers have streamlined the distribution such that nearly everyone has received their bag by 5:45pm. By 6:30pm, the last of the line is gone and so are 210 bags of groceries.

It's not easy work, especially in the midst of a pandemic, but Bill, Scott, Maribeth, and many other volunteers consider it rewarding and worthwhile to help their Annandale neighbors.

Editor's Note: According to Scott, money is the best donation the Mission Center can receive, as it lets them fill in whatever holes they have in a given week's supplies. SHORTEN THE WAIT: KNOW YOUR BALLOT

While Fairfax County Board of Elections is predicting the shortest lines to vote ever in a presidential election year due to the number of ballots cast early and by mail, there is something important you can do to shorten the Election Day lines even more. Know your ballot. There are two constitutional amendments and four bond issues on the ballot, as well as the races for U.S. President and U.S. House of Representatives. Read the Amendment and Bond issues before you go and know how you will vote. That way, you won't need a lengthy time at the voting table so, after your space at the table is scrubbed down by an Election Officer, the next voter in line will quickly have a place to sit.

Constitutional Amendments

Ouestion 1:

Should the Constitution of Virginia be amended to establish a redistricting commission, consisting of eight members of the General Assembly and eight citizens of the Commonwealth, that is responsible for drawing the congressional and state legislative districts that will be subsequently voted on, but not changed by, the General Assembly and enacted without the Governor's involvement and to give the responsibility of drawing districts to the Supreme Court of Virginia if the redistricting commission fails to draw districts or the General Assembly fails to enact districts by certain deadlines? Yes/No

Question 2:

Should an automobile or pickup truck that is owned and used primarily by or for a veteran of the United States armed forces or the Virginia National Guard who has a one hundred percent service-connected, permanent, and total disability be free from state and local taxation? Yes/No

Bond Ballot Questions

There are four bond questions on the November 3 general election ballot. Voters will be asked to vote YES or NO on each of these questions.

1) Public Library Bond

Bonds to raise \$90,000,000 to build, renovate, equip, and purchase land for library facilities.

2) Transportation Bond

Á bond in the amount of \$160,000,000 for the purpose of financing Fairfax County's share, under the Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority Compact.

3) Health and Human Services Bond

A bond in the amount of \$79,000,000 for the purpose of providing funds to improve community health and human services facilities and if necessary, to acquire additional land.

4) Park Bond

A bond in the amount of \$112,000,000 to finance the Fairfax County Park Authority in order to preserve open-space land, and to develop and improve existing parks and park facilities; and to finance Fairfax County's contribution to the Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority.

FLU SHOT CLINICS FOR SENIORS

Each year the flu causes millions of illnesses in the United States, and people age 65 and older account for the majority of flu hospitalizations and deaths. An annual flu vaccine is the best way to reduce your risk of getting sick.

To help protect older adults in our community, the Fairfax County Health Department of Neighborhood and Community Services are offering flu vaccination clinics at select Senior Centers.

This service began on October 6 and is available to residents 50 and older by appointment only (see dates below).


