# FREE GRAB & GO MEALS AVAILABLE

Fairfax County Public Schools has been offering no-cost meals to all children under age 18 in the County since March. FCPS will continue offering no-cost nutritious meals to ALL students through June 30, 2021. Meals are available at school sites and along bus routes Monday – Friday (except holidays). The updated pickup schedule at Ravensworth Elementary is 12:26-12:36PM. Pickup at Kings Glen ES is 12:10-12:20pm and at North Springfield it is 12:10-12:20pm or at the corner of Jervis and Ferndale 12:25-12:35pm. Child meals are free. Adult meals are available for \$2. No pre-order required.

Breakfast and lunch meals are offered Monday through Friday (excluding holidays). Breakfast and lunch are served at the same time. Breakfast and lunch are also offered at no cost to any student who attends in-person instruction at a school Monday-Friday. Meals for Saturday and Sunday are offered at sites and on bus routes every Friday.

# BLOWING THE CORONAVIRUS AWAY

As cold weather approaches, consider these ways to minimize indoor coronavirus exposure by Charles Horton, M.D; posted September 29, 2020

Mugs of hot cocoa, falling leaves, and—for those in northern climates—an approaching end to warm evenings outside with friends, 6 feet apart but still together.

It's autumn, and the coronavirus has even changed how we think about the changing seasons. We know the virus travels through the air, and as Harvard School of Public Health professor Roger Shapiro told The Hill in May, "It definitely spreads more indoors than outdoors. ... The virus droplets disperse so rapidly in the wind that they become a nonfactor if you're not really very close to someone outdoors."

So staying outside makes sense while the weather permits. But what about when it doesn't? Indoors, things get more complicated with that 6-foot rule: Research suggests the virus spreads most efficiently in poorly ventilated spaces. At the website The Conversation, several engineering professors described this by pointing to how the smoke from one cigarette travels to every corner of an indoor room—and sticks around once there. Masks help prevent many virus particles from getting into the air, but how can we further reduce the risk of indoor transmission?


The simplest solution is the way we've all cleared the air after burning dinner: Just open a window, or better yet, several windows. A box fan in a window would speed up air exchange further. To consider airflow more precisely in settings like schools and churches, a carbon dioxide meter lets us quantify how we're doing: People breathe out carbon dioxide, and it builds up when air stagnates. Conversely, when ventilation improves, carbon dioxide levels go back toward the near-zero level in outdoor air. (Note that carbon dioxide is the stuff we exhale, while carbon monoxide is the odorless, poisonous stuff in car exhaust.)

When falling temperatures make open windows impractical, air purifiers can still help remove the virus from the air. Their effectiveness does vary, and the simple, charcoal-based filters that take odors out of a room won't remove meaningful amounts of virus from the air. HEPA filters, those old friends of hay fever sufferers, will. They won't remove every last bit of virus, but they can reduce its load substantially. Other filter technologies exist but aren't normally used in residential homes. For commercial settings, a powerful UV-C light system—installed inside an air duct or otherwise aimed away from eyes—can also help disinfect air.

Where a budget allows it, the best solution combines warmth with fresh air: A "heat recovery ventilator" exchanges stale air for fresh air from outside, and it also recycles the heat, using the stale air to warm the colder air coming in. Heat recovery ventilators aren't cheap, but they work. My own church installed one several years ago and testing with a carbon dioxide meter revealed that the system refreshed the air inside the church much better than opening the doors would have. They're also more economical than leaving windows open in the winter. Apart from the amount of virus in the air, one other factor affects potential viral exposure indoors: the amount of time you spend breathing that air. When all else fails, Mom's time-honored advice for visiting friends still applies—don't stick around until they wish you'd leave.

# SHEPHERD CENTER CONTINUING TO HELP (IN PERSON & REMOTE)

The Shepherd's Center of Fairfax-Burke and South County (SCFB) has provided uninterrupted free transportation to medical appointments and to grocery stores throughout this pandemic to older adults living independently in their own homes in their service area who are unable to drive themselves.

SCFB serves senior citizens, 50+ years old, in central Fairfax, all of Burke, and South Fairfax County along the Route One Corridor, who are choosing to age in place by providing free services and programs. There is no income requirement for their services. If you are over 50 years old, unable or temporarily unable to drive yourself, live in your own home within their service area, and are able to get from your front door to a car in your driveway without the use of a wheelchair, you are eligible for their free transportation service.

Each month, they typically have contact with over 150 persons through transportation, friendly phone calls, or exercise programs. New volunteers are always welcome. Remote opportunities are available! Work from the comfort of your own home by providing office support, making friendly phone calls, managing their website, maintaining their social media presence, or become a driver for the medical and companion shopping programs. 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

# VIRGINIA RAILROAD EXPRESS (VRE) WELCOMES BACK BRADDOCK RIDERS

As more Braddock District residents return to work and congestion increases on the region's roads, many are rethinking their commutes. One option is the Virginia Railway Express (VRE), which has taken a variety of precautions to protect the health and safety of its passengers. These measures include an enhanced cleaning regimen, installation of social-distancing decals and hand sanitizer dispensers on rail cars and platforms, and a facial covering requirement.

To ensure social distancing, decals guide riders to window seats in every other row. Only 45 of 130 seats in any rail car are available to passengers. Currently, no more than 50 percent of those available seats are in use. VRE's train utilization web page helps riders find the train that best matches their social-distance comfort level. The rail system closely monitors ridership and has been adding and lengthening trains to allow for proper social distancing.

VRE cleans it trains twice a day. Overnight cleanings use acidic electrolyzed water, a potent yet nonirritating disinfectant. The acid produced by electrolyzing the water can be 100 times more powerful than the active ingredient in bleach. Produced on demand, this environmentally friendly product uses only salt, tap water, and electricity.

VRE has five stations in Fairfax County – Backlick Road, Burke Centre, and Rolling Road on its Manassas Line and Franconia-Springfield and Lorton on its Fredericksburg Line. VRE is operating on a reduced schedule, with nine trains running northbound weekday mornings and southbound in the evenings. VRE's mobile app allows for the contactless purchase and validation of tickets. As residents head back to work, VRE is welcoming riders back in the safest and healthiest way possible. # SMALL BUSINESSES & NONPROFITS CAN APPLY FOR REBUILD VA GRANT

On October 28, Governor Northam announced that Rebuild VA, a state grant program created to help small businesses and nonprofits affected by COVID-19, will widen eligibility standards and increase the amount of grant money businesses can receive. "Rebuild VA launched in August with \$70 million from the federal Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act. Governor Northam is directing an additional \$30 million to support the expansion of the program. Businesses with less than \$10 million in gross revenue or fewer than 250 employees will be eligible under the new criteria, and the maximum grant award will increase from \$10,000 to \$100,000." – Office of the Governor

Rebuild VA funding may be used for the following eligible expenses:

- Payroll support, including paid sick, medical, or family leave, and costs related to the continuation of group health care benefits during those periods of leave
- Employee salaries
- Mortgage payments, rent, and utilities
- Principal and interest payments for any business loans from national or state-chartered banking, savings and loan institutions, or credit unions that were incurred before or during the emergency
- Eligible personal protective equipment, cleaning and disinfecting materials, or other working capital needed to address the COVID-19 response. For additional information about Rebuild VA and how to apply, visit Rebuild VA's website at https:// www.governor.virginia.gov/rebuildva/



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

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# HOW WE VOTED—(IN-PERSON AT RAVENSWORTH ELEMENTARY)

Important note: This year, we cannot tell how our neighbors in Ravensworth Farm voted. That's because the figures for our precinct show only votes cast in person on election day. This year, about half of us voted absentee. Between early/absentee voting and election day voting, approximately 80% of the Ravensworth precinct's 1,909 registered voters voted.

- According to the Fairfax County Office of Elections, over 600,000 people voted in this election. This includes more than:185,000 people who voted in-person on election day,
- 190,000 people who voted in-person at an early voting location,
- 140,000 absentee ballots returned by mail, and
- 85,000 absentee ballots returned in a drop-off box.

For comparison, the last time we had a presidential election in Fairfax County was in November 2016, when 563,729 people voted.

# INAUGURATION, JUNETEENTH, ELECTION DAY ARE HOLIDAYS

The Fairfax County School Board voted to designate Inauguration Day as a student and staff holiday. The county's Board of Supervisors also authorized Inauguration Day as a holiday for county employees on the 2021 calendar.

Fairfax County Public Schools typically designates the holiday when it comes around every four years. The next presidential inauguration will happen on Jan. 20, 2021.

The school board also designated June 18, 2021 as a staff holiday to celebrate Juneteenth, which will fall on Saturday, June 19, 2021. Juneteenth refers to June 19, 1865, when news of the Emancipation Proclamation made it to the last state, marking the end of slavery in the United States. Union soldiers, led by Maj. Gen. Gordon Granger, arrived at Galveston, Texas with news that the war had ended and that the enslaved were now free.

This year, Juneteenth was included as a holiday by FCPS and by the Fairfax County Board of Supervisors as a holiday for county employees. After Gov. Ralph Northam announced his intention to make Juneteenth a state holiday, the Virginia General Assembly passed legislation to observe Juneteenth as an official holiday for state employees.

FCPS had designated Election Day on Nov. 3 as a student holiday. New Virginia legislation eliminated January's Lee-Jackson Day as a state holiday and replaced it with Election Day in November.

Below are other key dates to know for the rest of the academic year.

- Dec. 21-Jan. 1: Winter break, classes resume on Jan. 4
- Jan. 18: Martin Luther King Jr. Day
- Jan. 22: Inauguration Day
- Jan. 25: Student holiday/teacher workday
- Jan. 26: Possible return to in-person instruction across FCPS
- Feb. 15: George Washington's Birthday and Presidents' Day
- March 8: Student holiday/staff development day
- March 29-April 2: Spring break
- April 5: Student holiday/teacher workday
- May 31: Memorial Day
- June 11: Last day of school, early release

# DEER CRASH ALERT FAIRFAX COUNTY

Over half of deer crashes occur October through December. Fall is breeding season for deer so you can expect to see more animals on our roads. Please be aware that deer are unpredictable, and crashes with them are a safety concern. There are hundreds of reportable accidents involving deer in the county, and more than half of our annual crashes occur during the months of October, November, and December. Deer are most active before sunrise to midmorning, as well as at dusk to early evening, times when many of us are headed to and from work or school.



Drive carefully and remember these safety tips:

- Always wear your seat belt and drive the posted speed limit.
- Do not text and drive. Avoid distractions!
- Watch for eyes shining along roadsides. If you see one deer, it is likely that others are nearby.
- Use high beams (as traffic allows) to spot deer further away. Be careful not to disrupt oncoming cars.
- If a deer is stopped in the roadway, slow down and flash your headlights. Deer can become mesmerized or blinded by bright steady lights.
- Slow down (or stop if necessary) to avoid hitting a deer. You should never swerve out of the lane to miss one. A crash with another car or anything along the roadside is likely to be more serious than hitting the deer.
- Take your foot off the brake at the time of the crash. This reduces the chance of a deer crashing through a wind-shield or windows when hit.
- If you do crash with a deer, try to move your car off the road and out of traffic.
- If your car is immobilized in the roadway, turn on your flashers and immediately call police. Try to wait at a safe spot off the road.
- Rely on your own senses. Never depend on car horns or other devices to scare deer out of your path.
- If a deer is injured or killed, immediately report the crash to the police on their nonemergency line at (703) 691-2131.
