plant removal at Accotink Park, contact Duane Murphy at "<u>coordinator@accotink.org</u>". They could use the help and you get to spend some time with nature, with the added benefit of checking out what cool critters flow through our creek.

We are fast approaching mosquito season and you can help. Check out: http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/hd/ westnile/wnveliminate.htm for details. Eliminate or treat the standing water where mosquitoes lay their eggs. Most mosquitoes are poor flyers. If you are being bitten by them, they are probably breeding around your home. Many mosquitoes prefer to breed in still water held in artificial containers and need only a few tablespoons of water to breed. To discourage them, take the following steps: clean leaves and debris out of gutters frequently to ensure that water flows freely and does not accumulate; be sure that flexible plastic pipes used for downspout drainage are installed correctly, so that water may drain freely; and remove any old tires left outside or make sure they are clear of water.

RAVENSWORTH FARM STRATEGIC PLANNING

Thank you, very much to everyone who made our General Meeting such a success! We held our first community strategic planning meeting on March 29, 2007. As a group, we created a Vision Statement, a Mission Statement, and a list of concerns and opportunities for improvement. We did some prioritizing of these issues within broad categories.



A Vision Statement describes the future identity, while a Mission Statement describes how we achieve the vision.

<u>VISION AS GENERATED BY THE GROUP</u> – By 2012, we would like Ravensworth Farm to be an attractive, open, family-oriented, community that fosters diversity and a healthy environment, which is safe and close knit, with access to convenient amenities.

We are working on this draft to make it really capture the values of what we want to promote in our community. Some reoccurring themes are: Attractiveness, Family Orientation, Cultural Diversity, Safety, Closed-knit, Hometown Feel, Environmentally Friendly, and Healthy. If anyone has a version that captures what you feel are important considerations for our community, please contact a board member and share your thoughts. A good vision statement is about 20 words that identify us as a community.

The Board of Directors will evaluate the Vision Statement and refine it to present it to the community in a future communication.

<u>MISSION AS GENERATED BY THE GROUP</u> – The Ravensworth Farm Civic Association focuses the volunteer energies of the community, promotes community interests, and responds to community needs.

The Board agrees that this is an outstanding Mission Statement that will help guide our decisions toward achieving our vision.

A brainstorming session led to the creation of issues and opportunities for community improvement. After generating our list, we categorized the items into eight broad categories. They are: Green (environment-friendly projects), Community (creating a close-knit, family oriented diverse and open atmosphere), Safety, Zoning (covenants, architecture and restrictions), Appearance (cleanliness and appeal of the community), Parks and Recreation (creating and maintaining leisure venues and activities), Transportation (improvement in mobility of members of the community), and Public Relations (internal and external communications).

At the Board meeting on April 12th, the items were reviewed to determine which ones would yield quick results. The following list (Pg. 6) indicates how the group prioritized the issues and where the Board sees the best success for the immediate effort. Obviously, some of the issues on the list will take longer and involve more resources, especially you, the community and your volunteer effort to help achieve our collective Vision of an outstanding community of choice. If you are interested in helping out with any of these projects, or helping to plan an overall approach to achieving the Vision, please speak to a Board member and let us know. We look forward to your support.

Trees Promote Biodiversity

In the other direction, the most biologically rich place in the forest is the soil. Millions of tiny bacteria and other organisms found in the soil create the living base for the forest. From top to bottom, trees in the forest have various living parts that work together and continue to function in a community of relationships. RAVENSWORTH STREET NAMES TRACE ORIGINS TO THE CIVIL WAR

Check out our website for the ones that the editors have researched over the years. Here is the most recent addition.

Nutting: Col. Joseph H. Nutting, of the Twenty-Seventh Masachusetts Regiment, was a courageous and respected leader. As his regiment attacked Drewry's Bluff on the James River near Richmond in May 1864, Nutting and his sword were captured. In November 1864, Nutting escaped his imprisonment from Charleston, South Carolina and later rejoined his regiment. At the end of the Civil War, Nutting's sword was returned to him after the arrest of President Jefferson Davis, who had possession of the sword.

FROM THE EDITORS - THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES

May's issue of the Farmer Newsletter will be our last as editors. We are not moving, just retiring because of other commitments. After responding to a request for volunteers, we became editors in December 1989. In our early years, the typists used stencils, the Farmer was printed on a mimeograph machine at the school, and then residents circled a library table collating and stapling the newsletter for the scouts to deliver. 
