
FROM THE PRESIDENT:

Dear Neighbors:

I am writing this on the day after Christmas, sitting at the dining room table staring out at a sea of toys and presents strewn underneath the tree. Earlier that morning I walked my lab around Lake Accotink. As it was freezing cold, most sensible people were snuggled up in their homes. The trail was covered with snow on the back side of the lake where the sun doesn't reach it. I was looking for deer or fox, and for the first time in a long time, I did not see any animals at all. There were only two or three other intrepid souls out walking their dogs or braving a run. The lake was completely frozen over and the park was quiet and peaceful. It is almost unbelievable to think that this area is less than a mile from 495 and only 15 minutes to DC.

When I talk to people about living in Ravensworth Farm I invariably mention two things; the first is the easy commute into DC, and the second is Lake Accotink. My wife and I were only married two months, in 2008, when we put in a bid on our house. We were walking around the lake and talking about how great it would be if we got to live in a neighborhood this close to a beautiful park. We were laughing and talking about pushing a jogging stroller and walking our dog. Neither of us would have believed that eighteen months later that is exactly what



So, replace a broken machine, but don't replace a working appliance.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTIONS FOR PETS & THEIR PEOPLE

It is the start of a new year, and people's thoughts often turn to diet and exercise, making up for holiday indulgences. Pets also suffer from overeating and lack of exercise. But there are more things to consider than diet and exercise when it comes to being a good example for our pets. Here, in no particular order, are a few tips to a healthier lifestyle for our pets and animals in need.

- 1. **Exercise** Regular exercise has the obvious health benefits, but it also is a great time to bond with our pets. A simple daily walk helps a dog learn proper manners, provides some good quality time, and does wonders for the human counterpart, too! Keeping pets at the proper body weight reduces the risk of heart and joint problems, diabetes, and a host of other poor health conditions.
- 2. **Health Check Up** A regular visit to your veterinarian is the best way to stay ahead of potential problems. Annual examinations of teeth, heart/lungs, and body condition overall will be less costly than waiting for a problem to develop and your pet suffering needlessly from complications of preventable problems. Having a good "baseline" of information about your pet also gives the veterinarian something to compare against and determine exactly what is wrong when something isn't quite right with your pet.
- 3. **Good Nutrition** Like humans, pets who eat poor quality food just don't have the health reserves than those that a good balanced diet. Poor skin, hair coat, muscle tone, and obesity problems can be a result of a poor diet. Also, pets are not humans -- a diet rich in table scraps is not a healthy one, and can lead to problems such as obesity and pancreatitis.
- 4. **Good Grooming** No one wants to be around a stinky pet. Regular grooming -- bathing, toe nail clips, brushing teeth and hair coat, parasite control -- not only make the pet more pleasing to be around, it is much healthier for the pet! For skin and coat problems that don't resolve with regular grooming, please see your veterinarian -- there may be an underlying medical condition affecting the skin, coat, or toenails.
- 5. **Safety** Keeping pets safe is something most pet owners take for granted. However, take a moment to assess the toxic chemicals used in your house and yard. Are they necessary? Are all safety precautions followed? Where are household chemicals stored? Can your pet access these items? If toxins such as rodent poisons are used, can your pet access the rodents? Think too about enclosures for pets -- is the fencing secure? Can your pet get caught or hooked up on the fence, a tree, etc. and choke or be stuck out in the weather when you are away?

PROTECT YOURSELF AGAINST FINANCIAL CRIMES

Most crimes are crimes of opportunity. Only you can eliminate a thief's opportunity to steal your property, identity, and good name. Use the following tips to protect yourself against financial crimes:

- Don't keep your PIN written down and near your credit or debit card
- Sign new credit/debit cards as soon as you get them
- Destroy old cards after expiration
- Diligently review all bank statements every month
- Never give your account information over the phone to someone you don't know
- Never provide your PIN to anyone. Your bank or credit card company will never request it
- Make sure your credit/debit card is returned after each use
- Do not include your Social Security Number on your checks
- Do not write your credit card number on your check
- Get in the habit of inspecting to see whether any checks are missing from your checkbook or your check order
- Immediately notify your bank if a check is missing or if checks you ordered are not received
- Criminals who use scams for financial gain can be great con-artists. If a deal sounds to good to be true, it probably is
- Never allow anyone to work on your home/business until you have a signed contract outlining the specific work to be done and a specific start and finish date
- Always get several estimates before accepting a contract for work on your home/business
- If you become a victim of financial crime, immediately contact your bank, the Fairfax County Police Department, and the three major Credit Reporting Agencies

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VDOT SNOW SUMMIT HIGHLIGHTS NEW APPROACH TO PLOWING

When VDOT held a briefing for elected officials and their staff in early November, we were happy to hear that some lessons had been learned from the snow storms of 2009-2010, and that new practices have been adopted and will be implemented for the winter of 2010-2011. What follows is a summary of the steps being taken to ensure future snow storms will be dealt with more effectively than those in the past.

Early deployment to subdivisions: Salt/sand trucks will be pre-positioned in subdivisions whenever the forecast calls for two or more inches. Previously, trucks were deployed to subdivisions once two inches had fallen. Each subdivision will have at least one dedicated truck, with the intent of assigning the same driver to that subdivision throughout the winter. In larger subdivisions there will be more than one truck.

How neighborhoods are assigned and plowed: Crews begin plowing in subdivisions when two inches has fallen and main thoroughfares in subdivisions will be plowed repeatedly during a storm. Once the storm has stopped and those roads are clear, crews work to make residential streets and cul-de-sacs "passable." A neighborhood street is considered passable when a path is drivable (with caution) for an average passenger vehicle. The road will not be cleared curb-to-curb or to bare pavement, and may remain snow-packed, uneven and rutted (especially following any refreeze). Chemicals are not typically used in subdivisions, but crews will sand hills, curves and intersections as needed to provide traction.

Once drivers complete a minimum of one pass on the roads in a map, they report back that the route is complete. VDOT judges subdivisions complete through processed snow maps, resident call volume, AVL and feedback from VDOT monitors. To give crews a chance to finish their assigned snow maps, VDOT asks that residents wait a few days after the storm is over before reporting roads as "missed." Once crews have finished their routes, resident complaints are mapped into a database that feeds lists of locations back to the area headquarters to double-check and address. It is also helpful for crews if residents will park, if possible, on the odd-numbered side of their street to allow plows room to pass.

While VDOT does not remove snow from sidewalks or trails, crews are asked to be mindful of pushing large amounts of snow onto them. With major storms, it is often an unintended consequence of making roads passable. When shoveling driveways, residents should leave the last few feet at the curb until the street is plowed, as the truck will push some snow back. It also helps to shovel to the right facing the road.

Additional equipment: There are 600 additional contractor trucks this winter, bringing the total to 2,600 of equipment (mostly contractor) available for snow and ice removal.

VDOT road priorities: Roads are generally cleared from highest volume to lowest in the following order:

- Interstates (I-66, I-95/395, I-495, etc.),
- High-volume routes (Routes 1, 7, 28, 50, Fairfax County Parkway, Prince William County Parkway, etc.)
- Main thoroughfares in neighborhoods or developments
- Residential streets
- Cul-de-sacs

VDOT has a new number to call for reporting road hazards or ask road-related questions, 24/7. It is 800-FOR-ROAD (800-367-7623). You can get real-time updates on traffic incidents and road conditions at **www.511virginia.org**. There is also a wealth of information on VDOT's website, **www.virginiadot.org**.



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

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


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
