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The Green Thumb Garden Club met on Wednesday, November 2 at the home of Laura Asiello. Joan Richards, a Master Gardener from Green Springs, spoke on "Fall Gardening". She shared several excellent handouts about cool-season crops, as well as preparing soil for winter.

Beginning in 2012 chemical nitrogen will not be readily available at garden supply shops. It has become so concentrated in runoff in our area.

Joan clarified the term organic as no chemicals having been used on the soil within 15-20 years. Market Masters for Fairfax County Farmer's Markets do visit vendor's farms if questions arise. All vendors must farm within a 150 mile radius of the county to participate in the markets.



Mrs. Richards also talked about the ease and fun of dry seed saving for home use. Green Springs will sponsor a seed exchange on Saturday, February 4, 2012.

COYOTES ARE SPREADING IN FAIRFAX COUNTY PARKS

The following article was written by Ravensworth Resident, Elissa Myers and features her dog, Indi:

If you walk your dog in the woods of Fairfax County, you will want to be aware that along with the birds and the squirrels and the deer and the human hunters there are Canis latrans – coyotes!

Springfield Black Lab, Indi, was walking in the Lake Accotink woods yesterday when he came upon the remains of a deer. "It was disturbing, to say the least," Indi's owner said. "It was clearly a fresh kill – what was left of the poor thing was still warm," she said.

Was the deer killed as a part of the Fairfax County Deer Management Program?

The question was put to Victoria Monroe, Wildlife Biologist with the Fairfax County Parks Department Animal Service Division.

"No," responded Victoria. "All deer (6) harvested as part of the Archery Program at Lake Accotink Park are accounted for at this site. Judging by the smaller size of the deer (a yearling) and damage to the carcass, it appears one -or more - of our (healthy) coyotes in the area successfully hunted this animal. Eastern coyotes (Canis latrans) are currently our only mid-sized natural predator of white-tailed deer in this region. Coyotes hunt in small family groups and are able to easily take down younger deer and fawns. They are generally unable to hunt fully mature does and bucks," she said.

"I have been getting a lot of confirmed coyote sightings in that area, which I think is amazing. I had not realized the relative prevalence of coyotes so far east of the Mississippi River. Their family groups, social structure and vocalizations are amazing...we are truly blessed with such a diverse array of wildlife here."

And Fairfax County is blessed by having wonderful Victoria Monroe doing a great job of maintaining the delicate balance between the human population and our rich wildlife.

According to National Geographic, "Modern coyotes have displayed their cleverness by adapting to the changing American landscape. These members of the dog family once lived primarily in open prairies and deserts, but now roam the continent's forests and mountains. They have even colonized cities like Los Angeles, and are now found over most of North America. Coyote populations are likely at an all-time high."

Coyotes "will eat almost anything. They hunt rabbits, rodents, fish, frogs, and even deer. They also happily dine on insects, snakes, fruit, grass, and carrion. Because they sometimes kill lambs, calves, or other livestock, as well as pets, many ranchers and farmers regard them as destructive pests," continues the National Geographic writer. "Coyotes are formidable in the field where they enjoy keen vision and a strong sense of smell. They can run up to 40 miles an hour. In the fall and winter, they form packs for more effective hunting."

The web site of Fairfax City reports that Coyotes were first sighted around "the tank farm and Daniels Run, in 2001. They have gradually migrated and are now being reported throughout the entire City."

"They are generally non-confrontational and can easily be scared off by yelling or making other loud noises," but small dogs and cats should not be left outdoors, unattended, the site cautions.

Vicki Monroe also offers this advice:

- As with all wildlife, coyotes should not be approached, touched, baited or fed. It is important to keep local wildlife "wild".
- Do not feed your pets outdoors. If you do, bring the food bowl in at night to reduce the likelihood of wildlife (primarily foxes and raccoons) being attracted to the food at night.
- Keep your dogs on a leash when you go for walks off private property.
- It is important to "assert" your presence if you see one. Do not run. Make yourself appear larger than you are (puff up), wave your arms, and make noise.

LESSONS LEARNED DURING THE WINTER

I would like to encourage all homeowners and renters to own at least one shovel, preferably a snow shovel. Some people tried to remove snow in previous years with a dustpan.

Our children need to participate and shovel out neighbors in need, too. This is a great lesson in civic responsibility.

Shovel early in the day to take advantage of the sun to melt and dry the pavement.

Shovel often during a snow storm to keep up. It is much easier to move 1-2 inches of snow than 4-6 or more. We shoveled well into the night during big snowfalls. In the morning we only had 6 more inches to remove.

VDOT does not treat our local streets. Eco-friendly fireplace ash helps to soften packed snow and ice. Potash is a normal soil component. But you need to remember to remove shoes when entering the house to keep the ash dirt from coming inside.



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
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
