#### **Unrestricted Dogs Prohibited in Fairfax County (Leash Law)**

Unrestricted means not under the control of the owner or his agent either by leash, cord, chain, or primary enclosure when off the property or premises of the owner or custodian. An electronic device does not qualify as a leash, cord or chain.

(a) No dog shall run unrestricted. Any owner of a dog found unrestricted in the County is in violation of this Section. (b) Any dog found unrestricted in violation of subsection (a) shall be impounded, unless the dog's owner can be immediately located, then that owner shall be allowed to have custody of the animal, but shall be subject to issuance of a summons for violation of this Section.



#### **Animal Incident Reporting**

Call Animal Control seven days a week; 6 a.m.- midnight at 703-691-2131 to report an incident involving: enforcement of county codes and state laws that pertain to domestic and wild animals (ex: leash laws); animal cruelty; dog attacks or bites to humans and companion animals; emergencies involving sick or seriously injured domestic animals, including potential human exposure to the rabies virus; and stray dogs in streets and other public areas.

Call the Fairfax County Police non-emergency dispatch number at 703-691-2131 to report dog bites, animal cruelty or neglect, sick or injured wildlife, and human exposure/encounters with potentially rabid wildlife.

#### Dog Licenses Due by January 31

All dogs over the age of four months residing in Fairfax County are required to be licensed. The cost of the license is \$10 in person or by mail and \$10.65 online. Licenses must be renewed every year by January 31. In order to purchase a dog license, a valid rabies certificate must be provided. A dog is required to wear this license tag whenever off the owner's property. Cats do not require licenses in Fairfax County but need to be kept up-to-date on rabies vaccinations. For questions regarding license fees, call 703-222-8234. You must produce a valid certificate of rabies vaccination or current dog license receipt upon demand by any animal control officer or Police Officer or you will receive a court summons.

#### **Animals Causing Unsanitary Conditions (Pooper Scooper)**

It is unlawful for the owner of any animal to keep the animal in such a manner as to cause unsanitary conditions. The owner or custodian of any dog shall be responsible for the removal of excreta (poop) deposited by such dog on the property of another, including public places. *Editor's Note: Please don't deposit your dog's poop in someone else's trash can even if it is at the curb. If they don't put out their trash can every time, the smell can become quite strong.* 

#### IDs and Lost and Found Pets

Don't lose your pet! Most people think it'll never happen to them, but more than 6 million family pets are lost and enter animal shelters across the U.S. each year. Most of these pets are never reunited with their owners. Don't let this happen to you or your pet. 1) Arm your pet with a personal ID tag, a rabies tag (required by law), and a license tag (required by law). 2) Consider a microchip, tattoo or other device that will help shelters identify and return lost pets. Even writing your phone number in permanent marker on your dog's collar could help, should the dog lose its tags.

Information about animals available for adoption from the Fairfax County Animal Shelter is available on PetHarbor.com. The site is updated hourly. Adoption costs approximately \$175.

#### Dog Parks for Well-mannered Dogs

The Fairfax County Park Authority has always welcomed leashed dogs in all of its parks. Now, for owners of well -mannered canines who enjoy a good run or a friendly romp, there's the additional option of dog parks - fenced areas where unleashed dogs can have free play. At present, there are seven established dog parks. Additional off-leash dog areas are in the planning stage.

All the dog parks are public/private partnerships, developed in cooperation with sponsoring organizations of pet owners. The sponsors are the agency's liaison between users and local residents, Animal Control and the Police Department. They monitor and clean up the facilities, publicize dog park rules and regulations, and report maintenance needs to the Park Authority.

Users of off-leash dog areas do so at their own risk. Neither Fairfax County nor the Fairfax County Park Authority shall be liable for any injury or damage caused by any dog in the off-leash area. The hours of operation of all off-leash dog areas are dawn to dusk, unless posted otherwise.

#### **Controlling Dangerous And Vicious Dogs**

- 1. If a canine or canine crossbreed previously found by the court to be a dangerous dog attacks and injures or kills a cat or dog that is a companion animal belonging to another person, and that attack is a separate and distinct incident from the incident that led to the finding, then the owner or custodian of the dangerous dog is guilty of a Class 2 misdemeanor.
- 2. If a canine or canine crossbreed previously found by the court to be a dangerous dog bites or attacks and injures a human being and that bite or attack is a separate and distinct incident from the incident that led to the finding, then the owner or custodian of the dangerous dog is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.
  - The provisions of subsections 1 and 2 of this section shall not apply to any animal that, at the time of the acts complained of, was responding to pain or injury or was protecting itself, its kennel, its offspring, a person, or its owner's or custodian's property, or when the animal is a police dog that is engaged in the performance of its duties at the time of the attack.
- 3. If the owner of any canine or canine crossbreed previously found by the court to be a dangerous dog willfully fails to comply with the requirements imposed as a result of the finding that the animal is a dangerous dog, then that owner is guilty of a Class 1 misdemeanor.

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#### LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

I hope this issue of the Farmer finds everybody keeping warm. This is my favorite time of the year to do all those indoor projects I put off when it was warm and too busy running around. It's also nice not to have to mow the lawn or worry about watering the garden.

It's also still that time of year when our block captains are knocking on doors renewing memberships in the Civic Association and handing out 2014 directories. If you haven't seen your block captain and/or don't know who they are there is a mail-in option. We have a significant number of residents who prefer to prepay and mail their \$10 in. That way you don't have to be home when the block captains stop by and they'll leave the updated directory at the door. I'm also a block captain and inevitably have trouble reaching at least 1-2 residents every year. I finally have an update on the board's RFP for the 495 Express Lanes Community Grant Program. The original deadline was June 30 but due to some proposals requiring changes and additional information I pushed it to September 30. Unfortunately some of those proposals never made it in on time or were withdrawn. I therefore postponed the submission date one last time to December 31. In the end only one proposal ended in a qualifying format. This proposal came from Bob and Karole Nielsen. In 2007 a Boy Scout in Troop 991 erected pet waste stands around the lake with the help of fellow scouts and Ravensworth Farm residents for his Eagle project. The original supply of bags ran out and have since been purchased using donated funds (Fairfax County parks do not fund this). Ravensworth Farm volunteers continue to resupply the stands. Unfortunately, funding shrank to a trickle so they proposed using the grant for a 5 year supply along with some needed stand repairs. Hopefully by the time this issue reaches your doorstep I'll have received a response from the administrators of the grant program so stay tuned. Thanks Bob and Karole!

Lastly, I'd like to provide an update on the RSU debate that caused such an uproar in communities across the county. As you know I've been following this issue closely and trying my best to keep the community informed. Fortunately I have good news to share but the final amendment has not yet been settled. This excerpt comes from our Braddock District Supervisor John Cook:

"At its November 20 meeting, the Planning Commission Subcommittee studying this proposal received further guidance from the Board of Supervisors which endorsed an earlier recommendation of Commissioner Tim Sergeant to further limit where these units could be placed. The new draft would not allow RSU's in low-density residential areas. The Board also recommended the elimination of an option which would allow conversion of a single family detached residence into RSUs. Therefore, the ongoing review of the proposal will focus locating RSUs in the upper R-Districts, as well as commercial, industrial, and mixed-use planned development districts. The Board of Supervisors noted that while there is support for the RSU concept overall, there is deep-seated opposition to allowing them as a use in lower density residential districts or single family neighborhoods."

I hope you all have a wonderful February and I look forward to seeing you at our next general membership meeting.

#### 'CRITICAL WORK' NEEDED TO SAVE U.S. CAPITOL DOME

A \$59.5 million project to repair more than 1,000 cracks in the Capitol Dome will require the landmark to be covered by scaffolding for about two years.

The project began in November after two construction companies were awarded the work. For the next few months, the project will still be in its planning stages, and the dome will remain uncovered. But building for the scaffolding will likely start in the spring.

According to the Architect of the Capitol (AOC), once the scaffolding design is finalized, the art and statues inside the dome will be covered, tours to the top of the dome will stop, and a donut-shaped white canopy will cover The Apotheosis of Washington, a mural portraying the first president rising to heaven, an October AOC release said.

Then construction will begin, starting with scaffolding installation from the bottom of the dome up to the base of the Statue of Freedom, which will remain uncovered at the top.

The dome has not been repaired since 1960 and "under the paint, age and weather have taken its toll," said Architect of the Capitol Stephen Ayers in October.

"As stewards of the Capitol for the Congress and the American people, we must conduct this critical work to save the dome," he said.

Most of the construction will happen during nights and weekends.

#### JANUARY IS NATIONAL VOLUNTEER BLOOD DONOR MONTH

Ever stop to think about your community blood supply? Maybe you should, because your community blood supply is pulsing all around you. It's in local hospitals, on blood bank shelves, and in delivery vehicles on the road next to you. And perhaps your community's blood supply is even inside you right now.

January is National Blood Donor Month, so this is a good time to stop and think about contributing to your community as a blood donor.

If you already donate, you know the rules. You have to be seventeen years old. You need to be in generally good health, and weigh one hundred and ten pounds or more. And you need to show identification.

If you meet these minimum standards, you can probably give and the process is simple. Before you donate, you answer questions about your history to determine whether it's safe for you to give and for someone to receive your blood. The blood center checks your iron, temperature, pulse and blood pressure. Again, this is to make sure that giving blood is safe for you.

The actual donation takes only about ten minutes and is pretty comfortable. After you give, you'll relax before returning to normal activities. It's smart to make sure you've eaten before you give, and also that you're well-hydrated.

Giving blood, like many things, can go better with a friend. So you may want to ask a friend or family member to come and give with you. Plus it's always better to enjoy post-donation juice and cookies with someone else.

#### FAA CHOOSES VIRGINIA AS ONE OF SIX STATES TO TEST DRONES

The Federal Aviation Administration announced six states on Monday that will develop test sites for drones, and Virginia is one of them.

Virginia — along with Alaska, Nevada, New York, North Dakota and Texas -- will host the research sites, providing diverse climates, geography and air traffic environments, FAA Administrator Michael Huerta said. Virginia Tech will head the effort in Virginia.



The regional research effort is to help find the safest and most effective ways to incorporate Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS), often called drones, into the existing airspace.

Virginia Tech's proposal, one of six from across the country selected by the FAA, includes a cooperative agreement to work with research institutions and facilities across Virginia, Maryland and New Jersey.

"We want to congratulate Virginia Tech and its partners for this success. Virginia's selection provides an opportunity for the mid-Atlantic region to become a major hub for UAS research and testing, leveraging the growing private sector interest in UAS as well as incorporating military and NASA assets across our region. That's why we have long supported Virginia's selection, and have worked to highlight the strengths of a Virginia-Maryland-New Jersey partnership with the FAA," Sens. Warner and Kaine said.

"We hope this FAA research and testing also helps sort-out the legitimate public concerns about privacy and air safety as we move toward a safe and responsible integration of unmanned aircraft."

Although they're now mainly used by the military, businesses, farmers, government entities and others hope to use drones in the future. Universities across the country are starting programs to study them.

The FAA does not allow their commercial use. It is working to create guidelines by 2016.

Projections are that 7,500 commercial drones could be in the skies within the decade, according to aviation experts.

#### FCPS TO HOLD FIRST-EVER STEM-H FAIR IN FEBRUARY

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












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
