

FAIRFAX COUNTY LOOKING FOR FOSTER PARENTS

Editor's Note: November is National Adoption Awareness Month

Are you interested in becoming a foster parent? Come to one of our monthly information meetings or give us a call: 703-324-7639; TTY 703-222-9452. We welcome prospective parents the second Monday of each month 7 - 8:30 p.m. If the second Monday is a federal holiday, we meet on the third Monday. These meetings are held at the Pennino Building, 12011 Government Center Parkway, Fairfax, VA.

What Is the Foster Care and Adoption Program?

Today, over 200 Fairfax County children are in foster care. The Department of Family Services' Foster Care and Adoption Program offers temporary foster homes for these children, and services to help their families. When a child cannot return home safely, we seek to find relatives who want to care for the child and are legally eligible to do so. If a relative is not identified, or is unable to care for the child, we seek a permanent home through adoption.

Who Are These Children?

These are children in Fairfax County who:

- Have their worlds turned upside down
- Need a safe haven during difficult times
- Need a foster home due to abuse or neglect
- Range in age from infant to 18
- Come from diverse backgrounds
- Have experienced devastating losses of family and identity
- Search for a sense of belonging
- Have their confidence and feelings of self-worth shattered
- Feel frightened and alone.

What Do They Need?

- Foster and adoptive parents
- Stable, nurturing homes
- Someone in their corner
- To learn to trust again
- Day-to-day guidance
- Support from loving adults.

What Is the Difference Between Foster Care and Adoption?

Foster care refers to finding a temporary home for a child outside the home where he or she had been raised. This may occur as a result of circumstances that put the child at risk. During this time, family problems are addressed so that the child can return home safely, or plans are made to find a safe and nurturing home for the child outside his or her birth family. Adoption provides a permanent home when a child cannot return to the parents or relatives.

Who Can Foster and Adopt?

People who...

- care about children
- want to make a difference in children's lives and futures
- are 18 or older
- may be married, single, or divorced
- may work outside the home
- are able to provide a safe, loving home

What If a Foster Parent Wants to Adopt?

Children need families to call their own. With permanent homes comes lifelong support systems, love and a brighter future. More than 70 percent of our adoptive families begin as foster parents, and then commit to adopting the child in their care. Meet some children in Fairfax County who are available for adoption. LAKE ACCOTINK MASTER PLAN REVISION

Notes from presentation by Andrea "Andi" Dorlester of the Fairfax County Park Authority

Lake Accotink Management Option "C": Annual Dredging with Forebay

This approach would initially provide a major dredge of the lake, removing 350,000 cubic yards of sediment, plus an additional 150,000 cubic yards of sediment to create a forebay at the upper end of the lake.

All 500,000 cubic yards of sediment removed from the lake would need to be hauled from the park, requiring approximately 50,000 truck trips routed through adjacent neighborhoods. After the initial dredge and forebay construction, smaller dredges would remove approximately 12,000 cubic yards of sediment from the forebay every year or two, routing an additional 1,2000 truck trips through the community. The existing dam structure would remain in place, requiring yearly maintenance and repair. The existing dam structure would likely require significant repair and upgrades on an estimated 30-year cycle. A full dredge of the lake would still be required every 35 years or so.

Dredging options will require that sediment be hauled from the park. Possible impacts to surrounding communities have come up as a factor to consider. The Park Authority is in ongoing discussion with the railroad that runs through the park regarding the possibility of utilizing the railroad to haul some or all of the sediment.

Additional Study Additional study is required to determine the location of a forebay: Options include inside the current Lake footprint, upstream from the current Lake, downstream of Braddock Road, Wakefield Park upstream of Braddock Road. Dredging access routes also require study. Some possibilities include Accotink Park Road, Hemming Avenue, Rolling Road, Ravenel Lane, Inverchapel Road, an access from the head of the Lake to Braddock Rd, the Ravensworth Farm Swim Club, and railroad spurs.

Timelines The additional planning studies will be completed by the end of 2018. The Dredging Project would be added to the Fairfax County Five-Yer Capital Improvement Plan in Fall 2018/Spring 2019. A briefing would be held on the results of the planning study(ies) in early 2019. In early 2109, funding options will be considered. These include County Bond Program or VA State Water Quality Improvement Grant. If the decision is made to pursue County Bond funding, the next County Bond vote opportunity would be November 2019. The Board of Supervisors would need to approve its addition to the ballot by May 2019. If Virginia grant funding is pursued, the grant application would be due in the summer of 2019.

Editor's Note: The only option the FCPA appears to currently be considering is dredging Lake Accotink, probably with the forebay.

IS A REVERSE MORTGAGE RIGHT FOR YOU?

You see the ads on TV, in the newspaper and online. They push the benefits of a reverse mortgage for homeowners over 62—pay off your existing mortgage, supplement your income, pay for healthcare expenses and more. But, is a reverse mortgage right for you? That depends. While a reverse mortgage may increase your monthly income, it can put your retirement security at risk if you're not careful.

Reverse mortgages take part of the equity in your home and convert it into payments to you. The money you get usually is tax-free, and it generally won't affect your Social Security or Medicare benefits. But a reverse mortgage is not all sunshine and roses.

Here are some things to consider:

- A reverse mortgage does not guarantee financial security no matter how long you live.
- There are fees and other costs, like an origination fee and other closing costs, as well as
- servicing fees over the life of the mortgage. Interest is added onto the balance you owe each
- month. That means the amount you owe grows as the interest on your loan adds up over time.
- Interest is not tax deductible until the loan is paid off, either partially or in full.
- You have to pay property taxes, insurance, utilities, fuel, maintenance, and other expenses. If you don't pay your property taxes, keep homeowner's insurance, or maintain your home, the lender might require you to repay your loan.
- Reverse mortgages can use up the equity in your home, which means fewer assets for you and your heirs. Generally, you don't have to pay back the money for as long as you live in your home. But when you die, sell your home, or move out, you, your spouse or your estate must repay the loan. That might mean selling the home to get money to repay the loan.

A SHOT IN THE ARM

No matter what your age, nobody wants to be sick. That is why vaccines must be part of everyone's health care regime. Caregivers and their loved ones alike need to ensure they are vaccinated. Caregivers cannot afford to be sick, and older adults may be at risk for serious complications from vaccine-preventable diseases.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, below are key vaccines for adults over the age of 50. Different adults have different health risk factors, so other vaccines such as Hepatitis A and B or human papillomaviruses (HPV) may be needed.

It's important to talk with your doctor and make sure that you are up to date on your vaccinations. In addition to protecting against illness, vaccines help prevent the spread of germs. This is particularly important in multigenerational households. The older adults in these homes can suffer greatly if they become ill, and their likelihood of being exposed to illness is greater if there is a school-age child present. Also, they need to protect other family members from harmful germs. For example, pertussis (whooping cough) can be deadly for babies.

Tetanus, Diptheria, Pertussis (TDaP)	If you didn't get a Tdap as a teen, you need a dose. Td (tetanus and diphtheria) boosters are needed every 10 years
Pneumonia	CDC recommends pneumococcal vaccination for all adults 65+
Shingles	CDC recommends that healthy adults 50+ get two doses of the shingles vaccine 2 to 6 months apart
Measles, Mumps, Rubella	Adults born before 1957 are presumed to be immune. Adults born in 1957 or later without acceptable evidence of immunity should received 1 dose of MMR unless there is a medical contraindication

FROZEN PIPES


How to Prevent Frozen Pipes

Keep garage doors closed if there are water supply lines in the garage.

Open kitchen and bathroom cabinet doors to allow warmer air to circulate around the plumbing. Be sure to move any harmful cleaners and household chemicals up out of the reach of children.

When the weather is very cold outside, let the cold water drip from the faucet served by exposed pipes. Running water through the pipe - even at a trickle - helps prevent pipes from freezing. The slow drip from your faucets to reduce the buildup of pressure in the pipes. Even if the pipes freeze, the release of pressure in the water system will reduce

the likelihood of a rupture. "One sink is good. Usually the farthest sink from where the water comes into the house," Henrico Fire spokesman Captain Daniel Rosenbaum advised. "If water comes in through the front of the house, look at the sink in the back of the house. That way, the water is flowing through all of the pipes on the underside of the house."



How to Thaw Frozen Pipes

If you turn on a faucet and only a trickle comes out, suspect a frozen pipe. Likely places for frozen pipes include against exterior walls or where your water service enters your home through the foundation.

Keep the faucet open. As you treat the frozen pipe and the frozen area begins to melt, water will begin to flow through the frozen area. Running water through the pipe will help melt ice in the pipe.

Apply heat to the section of pipe using an electric heating pad wrapped around the pipe, an electric hair dryer, a portable space heater (kept away from flammable materials), or by wrapping pipes with towels soaked in hot water. Do not use a blowtorch, kerosene or propane heater, charcoal stove, or other open flame device.

Apply heat until full water pressure is restored. If you are unable to locate the frozen area, if the frozen area is not accessible, or if you cannot thaw the pipe, call a licensed plumber. Check all other faucets in your home to find out if you have additional frozen pipes. If one pipe freezes, others may freeze, too.

SNEAKY INJURIES

'Tis the season for easy living—until a bug bite, a burn, or a little too much booze does you in. More than 29 million people are treated in the ER for injuries every year, according to the CDC, and summertime is far and away the busiest season. (This is especially bad news when you consider the fact that hospital medication errors—and fatalities—also spike in summer.) Here's how to avoid becoming a statistic, and some treatment tips if you're reading this a little too late.

1. BBO blunders

Making burgers and kabobs sounds like a brilliant idea, until you remember that you aren't a grill master. U.S. fire departments respond to an average of 8,200 home fires involving grills, hibachis or barbecues per year, and burns to the skin and smoke inhalation are far more numerous.

Sidestep it: Exercise caution when lighting the grill and opening the cover, since once it's fired up, the whole shebang is hot.

Treat it: If it's a minor burn, hold the skin under cool running water to reduce swelling for up to 15 minutes or until the pain subsides. "If the burn is on the face, hands, or over a large part of the body, you may want to seek medical attention," says Dr. McGinnis.

2. Lawn mowing injuries

Cutting the grass is not only dirty and loud, it's dangerous: Each year 80,000 Americans require hospital treatment for lawnmower accidents, the majority of which are caused when other things—think rocks and sticks—are accidentally picked up and thrown by the mower blades.

Sidestep it: Make sure your mower is in good working condition, clear the yard of any objects that could be flung by the lawnmower blades, and don't mow without enough daylight. "Always wear proper protective equipment, including pants, long sleeves, closed toe shoes, sunglasses and, ideally, hearing protection," says Dr. McGinnis.

Treat it: It depends on where you get hurt but see a doctor right away if your eyes are injured. If you've cut yourself, clean the wound with soap and water, and control the bleeding with pressure. "If the injury is severe, seek immediate medical attention," says Dr. McGinnis.

3. Too-challenging workouts

You see a swimming pool, ball field or basketball court and forget it's been a few years (or decades) since you donned your varsity jacket. "As we get older, most of us haven't done enough to stay in shape, so we try to do things that our bodies aren't used to." says Dr. Wanich, "So basically, our bodies aren't adequately prepared." Sidestep it: The most common injuries are knee sprains, since older, less flexible tendons are less able to tolerate impact and load. "Warm up adequately before attempting any exercise," says Dr. Wanich. And don't just stretch the body parts you'll be using for a specific activity, like the shoulders if you're throwing or quads if you're running. "Every athletic movement involves the entire body," he says.

Treat it: If you have a sprain, take OTC anti-inflammatories and rest, ice, wrap and elevate it. "If after two days it's still painful, you have a limited range of motion, or you can't put weight on the joint, you should see a doctor to have it evaluated further," says Dr. Wanich.
