PROTECT OUR STREAM VALLEY PARKS WITH PROPER YARD WASTE DISPOSAL

Editor's Note: The author, Tami Sheaffer, was one of the speakers at the October 17 Civic Association meeting. Jason Remer, Jeff McKay, and James Walkinshaw also spoke during the candidates' forum portion of that meeting.

Non-native invasive plants are exotic weeds that threaten our parks by crowding out native plants and disrupting ecosystems. They spread quickly and are difficult to remove once established. Invasive vines such as English Ivy, Mile-a-Minute, and Kudzu grow to cover anything in their path and even kill trees, while Japanese Stiltgrass takes over forest floors and suburban lawns. Significant county resources and thousands of volunteer hours are spent every year combating invasive plants in our parks.

Some county residents accidentally spread invasive plants and other weeds by dumping yard waste in neighboring forests. Dumped yard waste can smother native plants and spread invasive plants, degrading our parks and forests. Invasive plants may grow from seeds, berries, or even pieces of roots in yard waste, so improper disposal of yard waste can spread invasive plants to new areas.

Fortunately, residents like you can help prevent the spread of non-native invasive plants by properly disposing of yard waste. Yard waste may be disposed of through one or more of the methods listed below.

Keep invasive plants from spreading in the environment by disposing of them with your regular trash in plastic trash bags. Use our guide at: http://bit.ly/36IIvfo

to identify and control invasive plants in your yard.

- Leave grass clippings on the ground to decompose and return nutrients to the soil. Grasscycling is low effort and reduces the need for fertilizer. (For more information on grasscycling, see http://bit.ly/2cfokqv.
- Compost and put your waste to use improving your gardens. Dumping yard waste in forests is not composting! Dumped waste is slow to break down because it does not reach the same high temperature of a compost pile.
- Put yard waste into paper lawn bags for curbside collection by your waste disposal company. Branches, no more than 4 feet long, should be tied into bundles.
- Keep pet waste and known invasive plants out of your yard waste. Yard waste is turned into free mulch for use by county residents.
- If curbside yard waste collection is not available, drop off yard waste at one of two county facilities: the I-66 Transfer Station in Fairfax or the I-95 Landfill Complex in Lorton.

As part of a Watch the Green Grow outreach project, volunteers are distributing free paper lawn bags with enclosed information cards to select residents living near stream valley parks. If you receive one of these packets, kindly let us know how you plan to use the bags by returning the enclosed response card.

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
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
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PROTECT OUR WATER: ONLY RAIN IN THE DRAIN

Storm drain markers on drains across Fairfax County tell us that anything washed or dumped down a storm drain goes directly into our streams, not to a water treatment plant. Our nearest stream, Accotink Creek and Lake Accotink, leads to the Potomac River, a source of drinking water and recreation.

Don't let pollutants from these sources go down the drain. Prevention is easy!

- Sediment: Bare soil, sand.
 - Grow native plants and use mulch on bare soil.
- Nutrients: Fertilizer, yard debris.
 - Limit fertilizer use, compost or bag yard debris, practice bay-friendly yard care.
- Toxics: Pesticides, motor oil, lead-based paint, salt.
 - Keep suds from car washing out of the storm drain they can be toxic to wildlife.
 - Use pesticides only when necessary and sweep up excess.



- Pathogens: Animal or human waste.
 - Scoop the poop! Keep bacteria from dog waste out of waterways.
- Litter: Plastic, cigarettes, styrofoam, cans.
 - Put litter in the recycling or trash.

Prevent and report storm drain dumping. If you see hazardous wastes like paint, pesticides, or motor oil dumped in storm drains, report it to Fairfax County at 703-691-2131, TTY 711. **Only Rain in the Storm Drain!** Make sure that nothing other than water ever goes down your storm drain. Help keep water safe for children and future generations. <u>CHRISTIANBURG HOME TO NATION'S FIRST DRONE PACKAGE DELIVERY</u> SERVICE

Christiansburg, Va. —Retirees Susie and Paul Sensmeier stood outside of their front door Friday, watching as a small drone zipped over their neighborhood and headed for their rambler.

The aircraft — operated by Wing, an offshoot of Google's parent company — approached with a high-pitched whine, hovered in the clear sky above their front lawn and gently lowered a FedEx box containing a new puffy vest for Susie. Across the street a senior FedEx executive looked on. He'd brought his children to watch, he said, history being made.

Drones have delivered medical samples and burritos in the United States before, but Friday's deliveries were a milestone for a burgeoning industry. The companies involved in the drop at the Sensmeiers' home and others to families nearby were the first to make commercial deliveries to homes.

"I love new things," Susie Sensmeier, 81, said after the drone had departed for Wing's base in a nearby business park. "New technology. A new vest. New experiences. You don't get a lot of those at my age."

Established delivery companies and start-ups alike have been promising to deliver packages by drone for years, but strict rules governing U.S. airspace have hampered their ambitions. Finally, this spring Wing and then a UPS subsidiary received the clearances they needed from the Federal Aviation Administration.

"There's been a lot of talk about drones. Today, we're actually doing it. We're actually delivering an e-commerce order to someone's doorstep," said Richard W. Smith, the FedEx executive. "This is not vaporware. This is real. It's here today."

In the drone industry people often talk about a "crawl, walk, run" approach to getting unmanned aircraft safely flying alongside planes and helicopters. Jay Merkle, the head of the FAA's drone integration office, said the industry has now crossed into walking, prodded in part by a 2017 directive issued by President Trump. Running, Merkle said, will be when projects like the one in Christiansburg can be scaled across the country. That still looks to be a ways off.

Clearing Wing to operate for what it is still calling a trial required painstaking work to figure out how to apply to drones rules written years ago with airplanes and helicopters in mind. The company remains bound by strict limits on its operations.

Pilots' groups have been carefully watching the process, formally lodging safety concerns with the FAA. And while the mayor of Christiansburg said Wing has been welcomed to the town, a proposal by Uber to launch a drone food delivery service in San Diego has been met with local opposition over noise concerns.

In recent written comments to the FAA, the Air Line Pilots Association International, complained that the internal manuals Wing relies on to demonstrate that it can operate safely are proprietary and so can't be assessed by the public. The far-reaching scope of exemptions from flight rules that Wing has sought, the group wrote, "appears to erode the safety levels established by the FAA."

But the FAA says it needs the data gathered from early operations to decide how to write any future rules — doing otherwise, Merkle said, would "completely stifle innovation."

Tom McMahon, a spokesman for the Association for Unmanned Vehicle Systems International, a drone advocacy organization, said progress has been slower than the industry would like, but that meaningful steps forward have been made in recent months. He said he expects that customers will come to appreciate the speedy delivery made possible by hoisting packages through the air. "It's like anything else we've seen with technology," he said. "We don't appreciate what it provides to us until it starts performing the service."

Susie Sensmeier, who agreed to take part in Friday's event after attending a Wing demo a few weeks ago, said she wished she had had access to Wing's service in the summer when her husband was recovering from a broken leg. Walgreens, which is also participating in the project by offering a list of 100 products for sale including over-the-counter medical goods, snacks and drinks, is pitching it as a boon to parents with sick kids.

The idea in Christiansburg, a town of about 22,500 where Wing set up shop in partnership with nearby Virginia Tech, is for customers to be able to use an app on their phone to place an order and get a delivery within about 10 minutes.

The drone that arrived at the Sensmeiers' had departed from a base that Wing calls a nest about a mile away. Built from artfully arranged gray shipping containers, the nest is like a slice of Silicon Valley tucked behind a Mexican restaurant and a bar in small-town Virginia. Inside, about a dozen of the drones sit on launchpads where their batteries can be charged.

The drones are made of the same kind of foam used in bicycle helmets and fly using a combination of 12 helicopter-like rotors and two wing-mounted propellers. A single pilot can monitor up to five of the autonomous aircraft from a control booth inside one of the shipping containers. Observers who monitor the air are stationed around town.

From the nest, the drone travels at speeds up to 65 mph and can carry three-pound packages to homes within about 3½ miles. When it arrives, the drone lowers the package, nestling it on the ground. Hundreds of potential customers have signed up, a Wing spokeswoman said.

Christiansburg Mayor Michael Barber said Wing had done a good job of being visible in the community, showing up at street festivals and markets, where they've been flooded with interest. "It's one of the more exciting innovations to come our way in a while," said Barber, a retired banker and veteran of town politics. "I've not heard any complaints whatsoever."

Wing isn't charging for deliveries, and unlike UPS, Uber and Amazon, the other companies that have obtained or are publicly known to be seeking approval to deliver packages by drones, it's not already in the delivery business. (Amazon founder and chief executive Jeff Bezos owns The Washington Post.)

Wing chief executive James Ryan Burgess said the company will succeed by forming partnerships with businesses big and small — one of its partners in Christiansburg is a local sweet shop — offering them faster, cheaper deliveries than going by ground. "Drone technology has the potential to be radically lower cost," Burgess said.

Asked why FedEx looked for outside help while UPS has pursued its program in-house, Smith said his company's expertise is not in building drones. Ultimately, Smith said he expects drones to complement the company's existing drivers, potentially hauling the one package that can't be neatly fit into an efficient ground route.

"We believe that Wing had a technology that was ahead of other drone technologies," he said. "The proof's in the pudding. We're out here delivering packages. Others are just talking about it."

While the development of self-driving cars and trucks — the other major technology poised to change the country's transportation system — has been marked in many ways by the absence of federal rules, would-be drone operators have had to contend with the strict control the FAA imposes over the nation's skies. Over the past half-decade, the agency has gradually found ways to allow unmanned aircraft to undertake increasingly sophisticated operations.

Wing and UPS now have certification as commercial air carriers, leading UPS to bill itself as the first "drone air-line" when its approval was granted this month. UPS is conducting deliveries of medical samples at a hospital campus in North Carolina and carried out a run immediately upon getting its new approval, laying claim to a first of its own. "This is history in the making, and we aren't done yet," UPS chief executive David Abney, said in a statement at the time. In practice, though, both companies are still required to adhere to a lengthy set of limits even as they've been granted waivers from some FAA rules.

Some changes were straightforward: Wing's small drone won't need to carry pilot manuals on board, for example. Other issues have been more contentious: Wing sought to relax the medical certificate requirements for its pilots and to allow pilots to switch over while the drones were in the air, but the FAA rejected those ideas in a decision issued this month.

Merkle said he expects the relationship between regulators and operators will continue to evolve, calling the work with Wing and UPS a "tremendous learning experience." "We are learning to apply to existing regulations in a very innovative way to maintain the safety our communities expect," he said.

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
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CONSIDER CLOVER FOR YOUR LAWN

Before the 1950's, clover was considered an essential and desired part of lawns. Then 2,4D broadleaf killer came on the market and smart marketing by the chemical companies influenced homeowners that anything but grass in their lawn was a weed.

Clover's benefits include high drought tolerance and nitrogen fixation – which make for an attractive and low maintenance "green" green lawn – no chemicals or fertilizer needed.

Traditional manicured lawns use tons of water, broad leaf weed killers, and fertilizer. Adding clover to your lawn can end the need for this waste.

Nitrogen Fixating

Clover, like all legumes, takes nitrogen from the air and through a chemical reaction, deposits it in the ground as an absorbable fertilizer. In lawns, it provides a constant trickle of of fertilizer to itself and surrounding grasses – making the whole lawn more lush, green, and healthy.

Drought Tolerant

Clover grows deep roots and needs less water to stay green than grasses. If you see clover patches in lawns in the summer, it is usually green, while the rest of the lawn is brown and dormant. Clover spread throughout a lawn can make it appear green year round.

Resists Pet Urine

Dog owners usually have brown spots in their lawn from their pet's urine. Unlike grass, clover is highly resistant to this and helps maintain a uniformly green lawn.

Grows In Bad Soil

Clover can thrive in low fertility soils. In fact, clover in a lawn is often a sign of low nitrogen levels in soil because it does so much better than grasses. Since it is nitrogen fixating, it can supply its own nutrients.

YARD DEBRIS COLLECTION: A MESSAGE FROM AMERICAN DISPOSAL

As we gear up for the fall season, we would like to remind you of our policies on collection. Please keep in mind, during our heavier leaf period, we will exercise our 10 bag / 10 bundle rule if needed.

Yard Debris: Grass clippings and leaves need to be placed in compostable yard waste bags. Personal cans may be used; however, they need to be marked "Yard Debris". Tree limbs and brush must be no longer than 4-5 feet in length and 3 inches in diameter. These items must be tied with rope or twine in arm length bundles. We will collect a maximum of 10 bags of grass clippings and / or leaves, and 10 bundles of brush per pickup. Items that are bagged and bundled are not to exceed 50lbs. Concrete; rocks, mulch, sod and dirt are not accepted.

Fairfax County Residents: Yard debris season is March 1 through December 24.

Leaves can easily be composted in your backyard making it unnecessary for us to come to your house for removal. If you have never considered it, here are some reasons why composting your yard debris is a good idea:

- 1. It's nature's way of recycling. Leaves, branches, and other organic matter originated from the earth. Why not keep it there?
- 2. Once it's done 'composting', the nutrient-rich product can be used as a better alternative to peat, mulch, soil additives, OR potting mixtures.
- 3. Save yourself the hassle (and cost!) of purchasing yard debris collection bags. Simply rake the debris into your composting pile and watch it break down over time.

Understandably, composting is a solution that will work for some, but not all of our customers. If you have the means, try it!!

And remember...PUMPKINS ARE COMPOSTABLE.

Either toss in your compost pile OR place at the curb on yard debris day.
